Submission to proposed Tauranga City Annual Plan 2020-2021





Introduction:

The plan fails to fully take into account the implications and far reaching effects of the Covid-19 endemic and of Climate-change.

- Loss of income from workers and businesses and unemployment.
- Fewer businesses and less tourism from which recovery may be very slow and more limited. (We have probably been over-shopped in servicing this area particularly!)
- TCC wants and promotes "well managed growth" when it is pushing poorly managed growth.
- The current rush to spend money on future growth, that is decided by old thinking, will only result in wasted spending.
- We have relied upon immigrants rather than maximising use of local labour. Unemployment will probably change this. This will have housing and rental implications.
- During the epidemic people have learned to manage with less travelling and to do more work from home.

This is not the time for the rate rise and expansion proposed in the Plan!

Comment and suggestions regarding the Annual Plan:

The Plan acknowledges a need to build on resilience to natural hazards, and yet it envisages further spending on infrastructure and continuing urban spread into Tauriko West and Te Tumu. Climate-change threats however would indicate that these areas are most unsuitable for infrastructure spending and development, due to the coastal Tsunami risk and sea level-rise and adding to already over extended transport corridors. Whereas the need is to development a more compact city and protect our versatile, food producing soils. We should be making maximum use of the infrastructure we already have in the ground, rather than, especially in the present circumstances, adding to it.

We suggest that the traffic congestion already occurring at Greerton and Barkes Corner could be alleviated to some extent by better use of the Takitimu Motorway with the provision of access ramps for Greerton (Chadwick Road extension?), and Fifteenth Avenue.

The Plan links "land and housing shortage" together. We cannot have a land shortage unless we create more by filling in the harbour! By linking land to housing we assume that providing more land to build houses, will bring the price of houses down. Then we go and build the same type of houses, either large or small on large or small pieces of land.

We need a change in thinking about what our housing needs are. The Plan states the need for "more up than out" housing development on the Te Papa peninsula but this should be promoted <u>in all</u> <u>areas</u> where suitable sites occurred (i.e. reduced shading; view shafts). The development of more areas of single storey housing on very small sections (no room for trees!) should be strongly discouraged. We must stop building – as in recent years – areas of single storey houses on very small sections fenced off from their neighbours by 2 metre high fences and covering the land with a sea of roofs. The Covid-19 virus experience is teaching us the importance of neighbourliness.

The lack of trees in newer suburbs is their obvious great difference with the older, "quarter acre section" areas of the city. The <u>Climate-change threat emphasises the major importance of CO2 absorbing trees</u> and their greenery should be a part of a healthy environment. A proportion of multistorey high rise apartments of up to 5 or 6 storeys, making maximum use of servicing infrastructure, and with surrounding open space community grounds and gardens with room for trees and play areas for children, should be a major feature of planned developments.

A little about us...

Film Bay of Plenty is the Regional Film Office. We are industry building industry – a Bay of Plenty-wide focused not-for-profit trust that carries out activities alongside, and in partnership with, other stakeholders to stimulate economic growth for the Bay. This is achieved through:

- Infrastructure development
- Screen production attraction and marketing
- Assistance with development and realisation of local content
- Sector development initiatives for businesses and workforce
- Networking and connecting the local industry

We want to capitalise on the global content production boom and build high value jobs (wage range \$1000 – \$6500+ per week) in the Bay of Plenty Region.

"The film industry in West Auckland in the 1990s, in terms of capability and experience, was not too dissimilar to the current industry in the Bay of Plenty Region. From that strong base we have built up the well-established and lucrative industry in Auckland."

The Screen Media Industry is worth \$1.8 billion to New Zealand annually for screen production services (\$3.3 billion overall). Statistics New Zealand halted its screen sector survey in 2018, but at that stage the survey showed 'Rest of the North Island' as contributing 3% of this total. With 5% of the population in the Bay of Plenty the region and with Tauranga the fastest growing city and economy in the country, this region has not been reaching its potential from this lucrative industry due to a number of factors including unskilled workforce and lack of infrastructure.

Over the past three years, Film Bay of Plenty has been working hard to mitigate these factors, and our efforts to build the brand and industry in the Bay of Plenty have been universally recognised and applauded through the New Zealand Industry, from the CEO of the New Zealand Film Commission to influential and active producers.



COVID-19

The arrival of the COVID-19 pandemic has obviously stalled the international and national industries, which is tragic for everyone involved in the region – from crew working on the large scale shows, to the one person shooter/editors who saw their small to medium business content creation contracts literally dry up overnight.

However, in the long term, there is a sense of optimism from some quarters, because if New Zealand can control the virus and re-open our borders at some stage in the not-too-distant future, then serious large-scale enquiries are still coming in and there are already productions and producers looking to relocate here in 2021 out of places like London, Eastern Europe and the USA.

Online streaming of content has jumped 12% as a result of COVID-19, which will further the demand for content creation to meet demand when large-scale screen media production can start again.

Film Bay of Plenty has been active in the wider Tauranga/Western Bay of Plenty Community sharing financial support advice, work opportunities, mental health advice and digital connection through this time. We are also in constant dialogue with other Regional Film Offices, the NZ Film Commission, Screen Sector COVID-19 Response, ScreenSafe and other industry guilds with a view towards supporting the industry through the lockdown and maximising regional rebuild opportunities on the other side.

Film Bay of Plenty will be distributing the new screen media industry Worksafe endorsed Health and Safety Guidelines Bay-wide when they are released in early May, ensuring that PCBU's at all levels of the industry are aware of new protocols and are operating safely in this new working environment.

The screen sector will have an important role to play in kick-starting the New Zealand economy when COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. Nationally the Film/TV/Media sector are a large employer and as more people are made redundant under COVID-19 we are looking to retain and grow jobs in the sector.



Strategic Plan

Our strategic plan for 2020–2023 has been developed out of a strategic consultation hui that included the Film Bay of Plenty Board, members of relevant EDA's (Priority One/RED/EGLT), and Industry and Tertiary Representation. It identifies the following core focuses – key functions that align with the approach followed by other regional film offices in New Zealand (Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch, Dunedin, Queenstown) that we work collaboratively with:

Infrastructure Development

Having local studio and post production facilities are vital in attracting larger scale work to the region. Key Infrastructure projects we will help and facilitate in the region are as follows:

THE ENTRANCE

Based in Chadwick Rd in Tauranga, this cutting edge facility featuring a Live Broadcast Studio and Post Production Facilities, will be commissioned in second half of 2020. Film BOP has connected the owners and the wider Tauranga/WBOP Screen community and will assist with workflow and servicing productions based out of it.

WAIARIKI FILM STUDIOS

There is a universally recognised shortfall of Film Studio Space in NZ to meet both national and international demand. This proposed \$24 million regional facility will allow us to bid for international jobs (\$15–100 million+) and to bring the economic multiplier of 2.8 (identified by ATEED) from these productions into our region, benefiting the crew base in Tauranga and WBOP.

We are in advanced discussions with the PGF, Social Impact, Iwi and Private Investors to realise this production hub with stage 1 of this project potentially coming online in Spring 2021. The project manager will be investigating options for the location of the stage 2 larger scale production hub, with TECT All Terrain Park offering a great option in terms of proximity to main centre's, backlot space and being council owned land.

MOTION CAPTURE SOUND STAGE

There is no proper Virtual Cinema Motion Capture sound stage in New Zealand with work being sent to Sydney. We have identified a potential space in Western Bay and we are in early talks with the owner of the building, a Western Bay Based Entrepreneur and Staples VR (the countries leader in Virtual and Augmented Reality), who would be interested in partnering with the facility. Attract International and National Productions

Anton Steel and I have met and discussed the potential of bringing productions to the region. With the combination of amazing geography within a short travel distance, the Bay of Plenty offers an appealing opportunity for the right production. It is my feeling that it is only a matter of time before the region's industry becomes established on the world stage. With the generous tax incentives offered by New Zealand, favourable exchange rate, complimentary seasons and the talent of the country's film crew, it is a very appealing place to bring productions to.

- James Lin, Vice President of Physical Production, Universal Pictures

In an industry centred around relationship building Film Bay of Plenty will continue the groundwork that has been done from 2017 to 2020 to attract more producers like James Lin and their projects to the region. Other focuses will be as follows:

- Work with Producer Tim White (I am Mother Netflix, The Luminaries BBC) and Australian Company See Pictures to bring TV series Call Me Evie to Maketu in 2021
- Until we know the realities of international travel, this will limit our ability to target large scale international jobs. However, the Waiariki Film Studios Project Manager brings with him a potential pipeline of projects through connections at his present role. If warehouse space becomes available in Tauranga/WBOP due to COVID-19 this will also open up opportunities to be able to attract productions like the recent HBO enquiry who were seeking 3200m² of space. Council lease underwrites of potential sound stage space similar to what ATEED has done for Kumeu, Auckland and Highbrook Film Studios would help enable us to capitalise on the international demand for stage space.
- Continue to work alongside the NZ Film Commission to service international enquiries such as
 US TV series Lying (serviced in April 2020) seeking a 'Californian Suburban and Beach Feel' that
 Mount Maunganui, Papamoa surrounds and Toi Ohomai Windemere Campus offer great options for.
- Build and maintain existing strong relationships with domestic and international industry (including streaming platforms and large scale content producers like Netflix, NBC Universal, Gaumont TV, Amazon, HBO) to bring projects to the region 2021–2023.

Grow and Support Western Bay Based Productions

In a world hungry for content, and with international streaming companies looking to fund and screen local based productions, Film Bay of Plenty is committed to helping develop Tauranga and Western Bay projects.

- With the post COVID-19 industry focus on kickstarting localised production we will work on attracting and facilitating web series in the magnitude of \$500,000+ production budgets.
 We have a web series of this size that we plan to have shooting in Mount Maunganui in spring 2020.
- Support local creatives like Jeff Murphy, Paul Innes, Gary Davies, Alyssa Stringfellow, Bridget Tapsell with long-form drama projects in serious development or which show serious potential
- Connect local projects/productions/creatives with contacts at companies like Netflix when appropriate
- Help investigate and facilitate alternative funding opportunities for projects outside of traditional sources like NZ On Air.



Sector development initiatives for businesses and workforce

Building up the skills and experience of Western Bay-based crew is vital for attracting and servicing large-scale productions and a core focus through the following:

- Connecting crew with work opportunities and experience. From Film Bay of Plenty recommendations, Western Bay based crew will have work on a TV series slated to shoot in Western Bay/Rotorua in Spring 2020
- · Individual mentoring/shoulder tapping crew for national training initiatives
- · Regular industry workshops including partnerships with national industry guilds for delivery
- · Targeted Industry Training to build up crew base.

Networking and connecting the local industry

Our role is as connectors and facilitators on multiple levels to maximise opportunities for the internal sector:

- · Screen facilitation for projects shooting in the region
- · Continued participation in Regional Film Offices of New Zealand (RFONZ) network
- · Lobbying National Funders to greenlight productions in our region
- Attendance at Forums to connect with NZ Producers and Content Creators
- Quarterly email showcasing Bay of Plenty People, Place and Infrastructure to the wider NZ Screen.

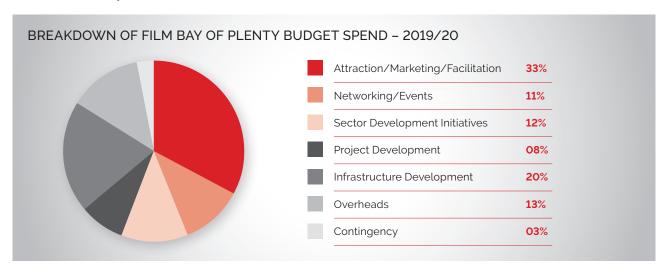


Ongoing Tauranga and Western Bay of Plenty Support

Annual Plan 2020/21

Submission from Barry Scott

People first

I have five requests to make to the Councillors. The first is that you freeze residential rates at the 2019/20 level for the upcoming financial year of 2020/21. The second is that you change or abandon the proposal to take over kerbside rubbish collection and suspend any action on the matter until the way ahead becomes clearer, The third is that you fix the commercial/residential rates differential number at 1.3:1. The fourth request is that you take steps to rein in spending on non-essential projects. And the fifth and last is that instead of a referendum the Council conducts "town hall" meetings to consult with residents.

The people affected

Section 82 of The Local Government Act lays down the mandatory rule that a Council must have an open mind about the representations that it receives from the public and also must have regard to the likely impact of its decisions from the perspective of the persons who will be affected by them, Ratepayers are often given cause to wonder if sometimes the Councillors - and the staff members who find so many ways to waste the Council's revenue - have forgotten that the rule exists.

Some Councillors appear to have in their minds a picture of a typical Tauranga household that is quite different from the reality. Reality isn't mum and dad living with their two or three children in a four bedroom, two bathroom, double garage house with dad earning over \$100K a year and mum not having to work. That's the minority demographic.

Reality for the majority is much less than that, it's a family that is getting by on no more than the minimum wage, a single parent family often receiving less than the minimum wage and propped up by the family tax allowance, a person on their own who has near to the same living expenses as a couple but usually receives a lower income, elderly people, single or a couple, who get by on little more than their superannuation and have to rely on the Government's Winter heating allowance to add a bit of warmth to their house.

These "battlers" are lucky enough to have their own roof over their head, but they still have power bills and insurance premiums to pay, repair bills, car expenses, phone and internet costs, and, most probably, mortgage payments. They simply can't afford to have <u>rates increases that are three times or more higher than the annual CPI</u>, and then on top of that to be charged for a rubbish collection system that they won't fully use. These are the people to whom not only dollars but even cents can make a difference. These are the people who, to make ends meet have to go without the tiny pleasures that many take for granted.

And, that doesn't apply only to homeowners. The effect of increases is felt by tenants too, because the landlord is bound to pass them on, and maybe with a bit on the top as well. It's no wonder that Tauranga has amongst the highest rents in the country. Rates increases affect everyone.

Today many of these residents face uncertainty and and more penny-pinching and, at the worst, a few of them even face the danger of losing their homes, owned or rented. This is the picture that the Council must have in mind when it considers who will be affected by its decisions.

Rates

My submission about residential rates includes the proposed change to the rubbish collection system because leaving that out would create the picture that the rates are going to go up by only 7.6%. That's a sham, a con some would call it. When the cost of the new rubbish collection system is added to the rates, as is proposed, the % increase could be at least double that figure and it would probably make our rates the highest in NZ. Certainly it would be the highest increase by any Council in the country. Being at the top of that list or even near the top is not an honour; it's a disgrace that smacks of poor management.

My request, and the request of hundreds of those who signed the online petition of which I have been part is that the Council freezes rates for the entire 2020/21 financial year at the current level, that is: at the sum fixed for the 2019/20 year. No add-ons during the year, no reviews, the set amount for the whole financial year. I also request that the Council does not make any changes to the current rubbish collection system now or at any time during 2020/21.

It is my submission that this request is justified by the fact that reasonable consideration of the <u>impact</u> of any increase at all, including rubbish collection charges, would show that it would have a harmful affect on the wellbeing of a meaningful number of the City's residents. The fact that Foodbanks are under increased demand to supply food parcels to our residents is a warning sign of what could lie ahead.

Yes, freezing will reduce projected revenue, and that means some projects will just have to be cut back or dropped, and that's not the end of the world (not even the end of Tauranga), but the help that the freeze will provide to residents may enable some of them to get back on their feet; emotionally and physically as well as financially

Rubbish collection

Although I have already touched on this topic it deserves a mention of its own. While the underlying principles behind the proposal may have merit, the Council's attempt to provide a solution is ham-fisted.

The nitty-gritty details were missing from the Council's presentation of its proposal to take over the collection service, including a true picture of how much the new system will cost residents. There only figure that the Council gave was in its feedback form was an estimate based on charges by unnamed other Councils. That's not good enough and it certainly isn't comparing apples with apples.

I have been involved to some degree in the online petition in which people were asked

for their views about the Council's rubbish collection proposal. Over 1200 people responded and the vote against the proposal as presented by the Council was 92%._

The strongest objection - in numbers and feeling - came from people who don't put out a bin or bag every week. Those people - and there is a large number of them - buy a black bag and because they have a small household they have to put it out only every second or third week. Their other waste goes to a transfer station or as compost for the garden. The cost for a bag is about \$2.50, so they pay \$52.50 a year, and even less in some cases, for their rubbish collection. In even the most optimistic scenario, the Council's proposed new system would cost them \$250. An extra \$4 a week for something they don't even fully use! Bring in a user-pays system that does not penalise people who do the right thing; that ends up with those who can least afford it subsidising everyone else's costs.

Another complaint, and it's a strong one too, is about <u>the number of bins</u> that people will be forced to have, which it is said will be four. A large number of people don't want that many bins on their property: they have no use for them and nowhere to keep them. Selecting the number of bins they will receive is another option that the Council must offer to residents.

The information the Council has issued to date is not indicative of a resident-friendly system. It does not appear to offer fair and reasonable options and it financially penalises a very large proportion of residents. It smacks of being a badly thought out proposal.

There is a bad aspect to the Council's handling of this matter that cannot be overlooked and that is the absence of proper public consultation. The Council did carry out a survey, (one that had the look of a sales pitch for a new laundry powder) but that is not consultation; it is no more than a basic information gathering tool for the Council. And yet, the Council has announced on a Timeline that states that the new service is likely to start in June; apparently without the provision beforehand of specific information such as the actual cost, comparison with other options, details of what the service will include and choices available to residents. This does not comply to the slightest degree with the statutory and Council's own principles regarding public involvement in the decision making process; it is not public consultation; it is a major transgression that could have the effect of rendering the process invalid and open to challenge.

The initial proposal must be changed or abandoned, but until the financial and social future of the region becomes clearer any action regarding the matter should be suspended. Making a start to the changes in June would be totally unreasonable and probably illegal as well.

Commercial rates

On the 24th of March the Council resolved to reduce the commercial/residential differential number from the previously set 1.3:1 to 1.2:1. <u>I urge the Council to restore the differential to 1.3:1 for the 2020/21 year</u>. Commercial rates in Tauranga are <u>the lowest of all the other "growth" cities:</u> in Auckland and Hamilton the charges are nearly double that of Tauranga, and in Wellington more than three times what we charge. (There may be more up to date statistics than these but I am sure that they

will not show much difference in the comparisons.) This is a source of funds that should not be overlooked and the statistics make it plain that Tauranga is well behind in its approach to this area of revenue collection. One estimate that I have read puts the amount under-collected at \$49million a year. Can we afford to do without that kind of money just to keep a wealthy lobby group happy?

The BOP Times recently carried a report in which it calculated that the owner of a \$1.07million median-valued commercial property would pay an extra \$12.13 a week in rates. Now, \$1.07million is not the average commercial or industrial property, small businesses operate from premises that would have a much lower value than that, so they might face an increase of only \$6 to \$8 a week. Even taking the current economic conditions into account small businesses will be able to handle that kind of increase, or even a bit more, because they can pass it on to their customers and the cost per customer would be small. Residential ratepayers, on the other hand, don't have anyone to whom they can pass on increases; they have to cop the lot; in hundreds of dollars. They can't afford any increase at all, especially in these times. Don't milk them to benefit commercial ratepayers.

Non-essential projects

Something is wrong with the Council's spending criteria. Personnel and projects are two areas that should be looked at closely. The Council is wasting ratepayers' money, and that's something that needs to be stopped; not just for now, but for good! When it comes to management the buck stops with the Councillors, but the blame for the unwisely selected, poorly analysed and badly supervised projects that have wasted millions of the ratepayers' dollars doesn't rest solely with them. Much of that blame can be attributed to poor performance by various staff members, including those who get paid fancy salaries. It's time the Councillors took a close look at the performance of staff at all levels and the need for their continued presence on the payroll; not through a hired consultant's eyes but by using their own talents, the ones they told us they possessed when they asked us to vote for them.

It's also time the Councillors went back to the drawing board, took the stars out of their eyes and with their red pen in their hands culled out the non-essential and merely nice-to-have projects. This wish came out <u>loud and clear</u> from the comments in the petition that I have referred to. For example, <u>a Baywave at Memorial Park</u> costing up to \$100million or more is not an essential project.

And, spending over \$5million doing up a small section of Wharf Street looks silly in the light of the current and likely ongoing hospitality downturn. What kind of revenue or beneficial side effects can the residents of the City expect as justification for this expenditure? Would a pause in this work do any harm to the City? Why is the Council so focused on wasting money in this way? And, you can bet that the cost will go up before the job is finished!

There is no way revenue is going to pay for everything in the Council's bag of projects and the Council is right to ask central Government to share a greater proportion of the financial load when it comes to capital expenditure. But, whether the Government comes to the party or not, the current and likely long term economic prognosis suggests, if not demands, that a policy of fiscal caution must be adopted by the

Council: essential projects only, no frills. And, stop the waste.

Town hall meetings.

Although the petition showed huge support for a referendum circumstances have changed since it went online and my personal view has changed accordingly. I now believe that it would be wrong to ask the Council to spend a large amount of money on a consultation exercise like that at the same time as we are arguing against unnecessary spending in uncertain times. Furthermore, the City is going to be facing fluctuating economic and social conditions for a long time and it doesn't make sense to conduct a referendum process during an unstable period like that.

Nevertheless, I continue to insist that the Council must carry out a consultation process in which residents can become directly involved, and I request that the Council set up and carry out a series of seven "town hall" meetings for this purpose; two in each ward and one in Baycourt. There would be conditions

- : That all Councillors be present, subject to proper reasons for absence. We don't want just three or four Councillors and a couple of staff members. Heads of Departments or their deputies should also be available to assist with answers to questions.
- : That proper minutes be kept and published as quickly as is possible.
- : That the meetings be shown live online.
- : That adequate opportunity be given for residents to send in written questions beforehand and also that time be allowed for questions and comments from the floor at the meeting.
- : That adequate notice of the meetings, including an invitation to submit questions, be given online and in a local newspaper.

Meetings like this provide benefits for all parties: residents gain a better understanding of the details, advantages and disadvantages associated with various projects and proposals, and the Councillors and staff receive an opportunity to learn about the way those projects and proposals affect residents and to hear their suggestions.

Councillors might argue that they are too busy with other business to spend time on such such meetings, but engaging with residents is part of their business and this is a very good way to do it.

People first

I remind you that the Council is legally bound to have regard to the likely impact of its decisions from the perspective of the persons who will be affected by them. I ask you to do that; listen to our residents; put yourself in their shoes for a while.

Annual Plan 2020/21 - Second draft

Submission from Barry Scott

In my previous submission I argued for a residential rates freeze, change or abandonment of the proposed takeover of the rubbish/recycling collection system, an increase in commercial rates, reining in non-essential projects, and consultation with residents through "town hall" meetings.

The second draft of the Annual Plan has not caused me to back off any of those arguments but I do have a few more comments to contribute with regard to the changes.

Rates increase.

The reduced amount of increase is a positive change but I believe that if the Councillors dig deeper into the books a further reduction can be made. Without picking any project in particular – because I don't have the necessary knowledge to do so - I suggest that not all the "wants" - a descriptive term used recently by Councillor Robson - have been culled.

Prior to embarking on your deliberations you will have received formal submissions and may have even read the comments made by pollsters in online polls and I plead with you to listen to the message that they bring with them: so many of our City's residents need financial relief, and a rates freeze is one of the things that would give them a little bit of help. And every little bit of help counts when you have your back against the wall.

Please don't head off to your deliberations thinking that 4.7% is a done deal. Try to do better.

In case some of you are deluded into believing that because our house prices here in Tauranga are high compared to the rest of the country we've all got bulging wallets, I would like to pass on a few statistics. Tauranga is one of New Zealand's six growth cities; the others are Auckland, Hamilton, Wellington, Christchurch and Queenstown. Out of the six cities Tauranga has the lowest estimated weekly discretionary income and the lowest estimated gross weekly earnings. By comparison with those other cities our residents are cash poor. And, for some, high rent is a considerable drain on their weekly income, and of course high rates and high rent go hand in hand.

Kerbside rubbish/recycling.

Shouldn't this be in the AP deliberations? Staff admitted as much earlier on but the proposal hasn't been included in the consultation form. Why don't Council and staff want to put it up for public discussion right now? It's what's known as a significant process under the Council's own policy because it affects in a major

way the wellbeing of so many of our residents. I have to ask, will it <u>ever</u> come up for public discussion or is it going to become an under-the-table job: <u>a de facto</u> <u>rates increase by stealth?</u>

I have been told by Democracy Services (in dealing with this case the name of the department is something of an oxymoron) that, "there will be no additional consultation regarding the kerbside project, as this has already taken place." That's rubbish: there hasn't been any proper consultation at all: no prices, no options, no formats, no comparative assessments. Nothing. It's an egregious breach of the Council's obligations under the LGA.

What's going on, what deals have been made with Western Bay, what is the result of the tender process, what kind of steps are being taken to protect residents against a failure of the system, does the Council have a fall-back plan, will the cost go up every year, are zero wasters being penalised, what are the true advantages and disadvantages of the proposed system, will it achieve its objective? This is some of the information that residents are legally entitled to have and which Council seems to be singularly disinclined to disclose. Do the job of disclosure and consultation properly. You have made a poor fist of it so far.

Commercial rates.

The differential of 1:1.2 is contained in the LTP, so it's hard to argue against it. But, this year's increase is the last step provided for in the LTP; there's nothing in there about what happens next year. Given the huge difference between what Tauranga collects and other Councils collect in the way of commercial rates as a proportion of the total sum there is an awful lot of room for further increases, and we will be looking for it in next year's Annual Plan.

Non-essential projects.

I will leave it to others more knowledgeable than I to determine what is essential and what's not, but one thing does trouble me: why is there this overwhelming focus on the CBD? So far as shopping and services are concerned CBDs are not where people go these days. They go to the suburban malls that are close to home and where they can easily find a park. And yet here we are spending about \$16million on Elizabeth Street and Wharf Street. I can't see the cost benefit in those projects. Undoubtedly some work on Elizabeth Street will be needed, but just putting it back to what it was before, a footpath, would be an awful lot cheaper than trying to turn it into a ersatz esplanade

Town planning for suburban hubs that will provide shopping, services and employment would be of greater benefit to community wellbeing – and it would reduce cross-town traffic and the demand for parking downtown as well. Think about that.

Town Hall meetings

Over in Papamoa we are fortunate to have Councillors who go out of their way to meet with residents on a face-to-face basis, and I'm sure the rest of you do the

same in one way or another. Consultation that <u>involves residents</u> is better than online documents and newsletters that are simply <u>aimed at residents</u>. Don't rely solely on one-dimensional, statistic-overloaded reports from staff when you are making decisions that will have a strong personal impact upon residents, speak with the residents themselves. That will create greater understanding on both sides of rationale and effects. Town hall meetings and their neighbourhood equivalent are good ways to do that.

The clouds on the horizon.

For ratepayers, not all the clouds on the horizon are caused by the effects of the pandemic

There are those almost petulant warnings in the 28 May meeting agenda about likely rates increases of between 2% and 3% if certain expenditure items are temporarily suspended. Especially notable - to my mind, anyway - is the comment about the "short-term adjustments" in staff costs: "Some of these costs may resume the following year with a consequential rates increase in 2021/22 of up to 2.5%." Maybe the staff situation should be reviewed by the Councillors for the purpose of finding out if there are ways the Council can make permanent changes in this area that would result in the expenditure being stabilised instead of just taking its leaping annual growth for granted.

Then there is the cloud cast by looming financial hurts: the Harrington Street failure, whilst probably not a Council fault, will mean more millions down the drain in the near future. What about the more than \$100million that will have to be found for the Papamoa wastewater project. And of course there's Bella Vista and the Cayman Apartments, we're not going to get out of those without some serious financial pain. Add all of these things together and we have a large amount of money that will have to be spent for no return. Where does this appear in the council's financial prognostications? Are we heading for a big hit on ratepayers to clean up the mess? This isn't mere rhetoric. I consider that residents are legally entitled to know the answers to these questions and I will be pursuing the matter until I find out what they are. I hasten to say that I'm not suggesting that the information is being deliberately withheld from residents only that it hasn't been explained satisfactorily.

A third cloud on the horizon is the almost certain bet that there will be a cost blowout in any big or medium-size project that the Council takes on, and we don't hear about the small ones but I'll bet that they happen there, too. I won't bother to list those that have surfaced over the last few years, we all know what they are. But, I do have to talk about the real big one: the Papamoa wastewater project. An eye-watering miscalculation there: more than 200% wrong. Staff said, according to the BOP Times, the costing work was "probably not robust enough." Well, that's putting it mildly! Costing is one thing, and scrutiny and supervision of projects are also, quite plainly, not up to scratch. This is borne out by the need for outside investigators to be called in to find out what has gone wrong on certain projects

and for the Council control systems to be put on watch by central Government. What's going on, this isn't normal? I suggest that it's time Councillors took a stronger interest in this problem by creating a sub-committee (of what committee I'm not sure) to investigate and come up with a remedy. We can't go on wasting money this way! Of course, the sub-committee's findings and recommendations should be made public, no holding back of the findings.

Draft TCC Annual Plan 1920/21

by Tauranga Community Housing Trust (TCHT)

TCHT is a long established registered community housing provider (CHP) which supports a wide range of individuals and families with unmet housing needs. Currently we manage approximately 200 tenancies of which we own 34 in Tauranga and 72 in Whakatane.

We have appreciated our long relationship with your Council and with our wider community stakeholders and are proud of our ongoing efforts to grow a sustainable portfolio of quality affordable housing in a very challenging environment

However we regret that our regular engagement and annual submissions over the last number of years have not led to outcomes of a wider range of social housing or specific partnership opportunities with TCC.

In this exceptional year the local housing crisis has been highlighted and we commend the TCC initiatives to address homelessness. The social housing sector has stated for at least the last five years that the key to this is to build more affordable rental and first home units. The range of social problems is only being hidden and not resolved by gathering vulnerable people often with complex needs into extra motel units funded by MSD. You may be aware that TCHT has declined an additional housing contract for motel accommodation on principle. We believe this accommodation format for high need/risk tenants is inappropriate and potentially unsafe. People require satisfactory long term and appropriate housing to achieve real results - not band aids. Many permanent new places could have been built over the last year with the money spent on short term accommodation in Tauranga.

We request that TCC advocates more strongly to Central Government, and also engages in sustainable partnerships, for at least 500 extra social housing units with varying typologies, to be built in the city, near to public transport and amenities, over the next three years. We seek a stated measurable target in your Annual Plan that can be reported against in your

A specific project and funding stream is needed for staff to be able to actually set in place some actions to increase city social housing stock. Council has the data, the knowledge and the strong community concern, but appears to have no public commitment to actual actions. An integrated housing construction action plan must be agreed on and actioned by all stakeholders. This gives some certainty as now is happening in Auckland, thanks to the active leadership of the Council and the key stakeholders

In response to this Annual Plan process and to inform early planning for next year's LTP TCHT requests the following

- 1. Amendment of the Development Contributions Policy this year to give at least 50% relief of TCC charges for registered CHP's who are developing new homes to permanently add to their community housing stock. As you know, entities such as TCHT find it very difficult to fund building projects when having to raise all the capital themselves without Government loans or grants. There is precedent for this policy as a "community good" and we now seek certainty through a specific statement in the DC policy so that the current delegated power can be applied automatically when the waiver/relief application is received.
- 2. Planning Changes Thank you for the resources being put in to matters which will encourage more intensification, and possibly some mixed use suburban hubs. We expect that more variety of housing choice and ownership models will be incentivised. However, the proposed timeframe appears to treat all areas of the city in the same way. TCHT strongly recommends that even prior to the final shape of the Urban Development Bill being known, that TCC regards at least part of the Te Papa peninsula as a form of the proposed city Special Development Project model for high growth areas without waiting for Government intervention. We propose that TCC facilitates a plan (tool kit) to give certainty and leadership to a complex transformational brownfields development focused on the main transit route and the advantage of established community amenities for the next ten years. We understand that risk management, transit oriented development and infrastructure analysis for this area is already well underway and should not be held back by the challenges that need to be addressed in greenfields Te Tumu and Tauriko West. TCHT regrets that little work appears to be happening on inclusionary zoning or any form of title covenant restrictions on keeping a proportion of new developments in an affordable pool inspite of regular requests from the social housing sector. This must be incorporated in the work programme for consultation next year if there is to be any shift in our community culture to "everyone deserves a secure home". It is unfortunate that the opportunities offered to encourage affordability were not taken advantage of when TCC approved 14 Special Housing Areas from 2013-2019 and except for Manawa most homes were just "more of the same" in a median house price bracket.

Please focus on getting draft plan changes for Te Papa Peninsula in place under a shortened timeframe to notify them for the RMA process in the next few months

- 3. Pukehinahina Council is urged to take leadership along with Accessible Properties in a new named and funded TCC partnership project for the Gate Pa area Pukehinahina. We refer you to the widely circulated proposal and the research data backing the wish for "more medium density with a better mix of housing, in partnership with others to achieve three times the number of homes... to achieve a place that revitalises as it grows". A CHP such as TCHT can see the huge potential for everyone to benefit as supply increases, but Council facilitation, mana whenua support and Kainga Ora/Min Housing & Urban Development investment will be necessary for progress to be made on the scale that provides well integrated planning in association with the DHB properties. We note reference in some financing option documents and other research to "value uplift and value capture, or betterment tax principles" and request that future Council social and physical infrastructure development plans do modelling on these possibilities for future intensification within 800 meters (10 minutes) of efficient public transport and local facilities, not just in Te Papa but also for the greenfields areas.
- 4. Elder Housing TCHT asks to be included from an early stage in further discussions on future options for older people, as we all know that this is a hidden area of high demand, especially as the numbers of lifelong renters over 65 rapidly increases. The Annual Plan refers to this as having ongoing benefit not only to the tenants, but also to the community. We are aware of the last LTP deciding to prepare these 246 homes for divestment although social sector groups recommended other partnership options. Unfortunately, no proposals that TCHT has suggested in recent years have been responded to. We note the suggestion now is to investigate options for firstly the divestment of two well located blocks of units that we understand are no longer fit for modern purposes. Cresa research in Tauranga indicates the future need for more places for older people and the values of various models so that they can continue to live independently in an appropriate housing community. We support Council as the landowner along with experienced local construction, Min Housing & Urban Development and community housing provider partners, staging the redevelopment of these sites to provide at least three times the current number of units for older people on an "up not out" basis, depending on the new residential planning framework that you introduce in the near future.

TCHT Supplementary Submission to TCC Annual Plan 2020/21 Request for Remission of Development Contributions

Tauranga Community Housing Trust as one of only a few registered Community Housing Providers in Tauranga, seeks special D.C. consideration through this Council Annual Plan process. We ask for you to recognise our ongoing contribution to supporting our shared objective of increasing the supply of social housing in the City.

The WBOP Homelessness Strategy prepared by Lycus Ltd and released in late April updates the current situation and proposes future actions and the role of local government. This TCHT request is one small part of the coordinated approach that is needed by all stakeholders.

We have negotiated the purchase of a property with a local experienced developer in a very convenient Greerton location. The complex will result in twelve new accessible single bedroom homes with adequate carpark provision in six duplex units each on separate titles.

As you know we have a TCHT goal is to provide an increased supply of long term social rentals particularly for older people or those with disabilities. While we expect prior site use to reduce the calculations for liable development contributions to five household unit equivalents HUE, `` at the building consent stage we also wish to have a review of the initial fees paid by the previous owner at the original subdivision stage. We understand that these were passed on to TCHT in subsequent purchase price negotiations.

For various reasons out of our control we have been unable to clarify the details in time for this submission, but we hope to be able to provide more specific information when speaking to this submission.

While we are aware of the delegated discretionary ability to waiver some costs under S.7.2.2 of the current Development Contributions Policy, TCHT is using the AP process in order to obtain certainty when finalising our construction costs budget for our commercial bank loan arrangements. We anticipate this to be well over \$4 million. Unfortunately no capital funding is available from Government although we expect to receive some assistance with operational costs.

Therefore we refer to S. 2.14.4 where Council will consider making grants to offset D.C. for a development that has community good. These 12 new units will provide continuing benefit to vulnerable people in our community. We wish we were able to build more.

Thank you and TCHT wishes to speak to this submission along with our primary A.P. response.

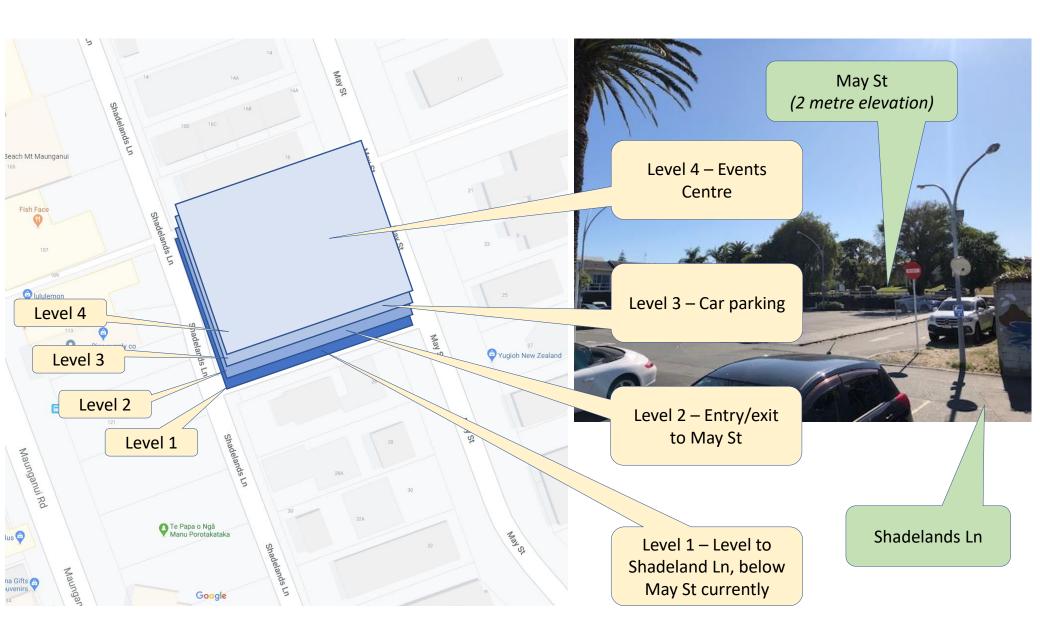

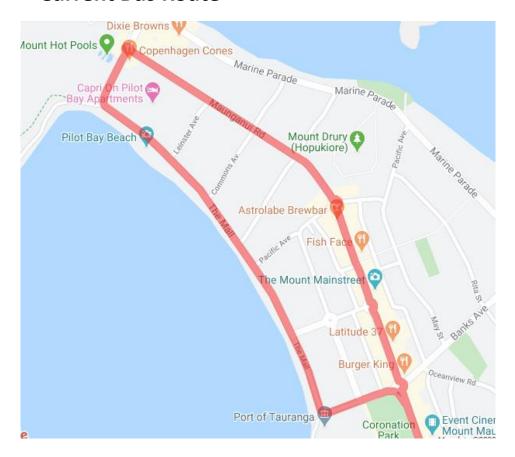

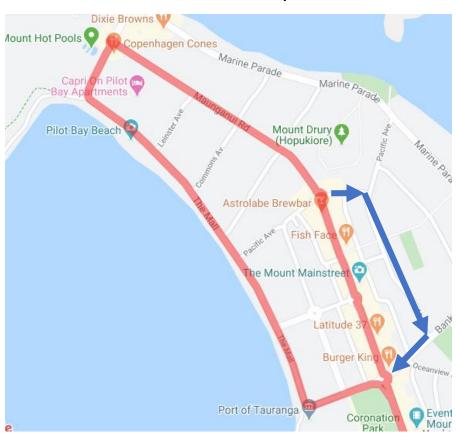

SUBMISSION TO TAURANGA CITY COUNCIL'S DRAFT ANNUAL PLAN 2020-21

SUMMARY OF SUBMISSION

This submission:

- § Supports the proposed overall rates increase of 7.6% in the 2020-21 year.
- § Urges Council to prioritise infrastructure spending to create economic stimulus and flow-on benefit to assist the city recover from the economic impact of Covid-19. We note this is the single most important thing Council can do to aid in the recovery and to keep members of our community in employment.
- § Strongly supports Council to consider alternative ways to fund infrastructure and get debt off Council's balance sheet, i.e. greater use of targeted rates; private sector investment and/or establishing separate entities to manage assets such as water.
- § Supports Council's leadership role in the delivery of collaborative initiatives such as SmartGrowth and UFTI, noting the importance of collaboration with other local authorities to ensure the future sustainability of our sub-regional community and economy. These initiatives help maintain central Government confidence in the region and provide investment confidence to the private sector. They are also critical elements for the city and region to remain competitive in the attraction of new business and talent.

PRIORITY ONE

Priority One is the economic development enabler for Tauranga and the Western Bay of Plenty. The organisation reflects a partnership between the business community and local authorities, with substantial funding and support provided by businesses and individuals committed to seeing positive change through increased economic prosperity across our community. Priority One is also contracted to deliver economic outcomes by Tauranga City Council and Western Bay of Plenty District Council.

Priority One's core role is to build the sub-region's economic depth beyond an historic reliance on population growth as our key economic driver. It works to bring more diversity to an economy that is highly reliant on horticulture, retail and construction. Priority One uses the partnership it has built between the business community and SmartGrowth partners, to progress initiatives that build real competitive advantages for the sub-region.

COVID-19

The COVID-19 health crisis has caused a severe impact on world, NZ and local economies. The initial effects created sector-based demand and isolated supply impacts which have subsequently escalated into what will likely be a large global recession. The speed of this escalation has been unprecedented, with the depth and length of the recession still highly variable.

Domestically, the Level 4 lockdown (26th March-27th April), meant many businesses were unable to operate and consequently face significant impacts on their cashflow, meaning the economy has taken a very sharp dip. The move to Level 3 on 28th April has enabled more of our economy to get back to work, however there are still severe restrictions on how they are able to operate and low consumer confidence, supply chain disruption and lack of international demand means spending is likely to be subdued for some time. The NZ government's Wage Subsidy Scheme has been accessed by the majority of local businesses and has helped alleviate short term cashflow issues and allow businesses to retain staff, however as the wage subsidy comes to an end, we are likely to see more redundancies in severely affected sectors such as tourism, retail and hospitality. Fiscal stimulus will aid longer term recovery if targeted to the right areas.

In the Western Bay sub-region, we have seen severe sector-based impacts in tourism, hospitality and retail. We are fortunate that our large sectors (horticulture, food manufacturing, health and education), with the exception of construction, were able to continue operating under Level 4 restrictions, albeit at reduced capacity. The outlook post-level 4 is also reasonable for our main industries and due to the strong position our economy was in prior to lockdown, the sub-region has the potential to come out of the recession better than many other regions. Despite this, we expect the secondary effects of the shock to be substantial with lower business and consumer confidence and credit issues leading to reduced spend, investment and likely solvency issues.

In a recession the community needs Council to be a strong player. Retrenchment of operating or capital expenditure will be highly negative to economic recovery. That is why we support the rates increase in this environment.

SUBMISSION

Infrastructure investment

We strongly support Council's core role in continuing to fund infrastructure where this investment is targeted towards areas of strategic significance such as Te Papa Peninsula intensification, Tauriko, Te Tumu, Rangiuru and roading around the Port. From a Priority One perspective we will also be focusing efforts into projects that directly support our labour market. Investment into these areas will be crucial for us as we recover from our economic troubles.

In very difficult times like these, Council's continued investment into strategic infrastructure is the <u>single biggest thing</u> Council can do to help mitigate the impacts of recession.

Proposed rates increase

The Draft 2020-21 Annual Plan acknowledges Council's growth related funding challenges and proposes an overall rates increase of 7.6%, a reduction on the 12.6% overall rates increase originally proposed by Council. We support the reduction in the proposed increase as it strikes a balance between recognising the economic challenges being felt by businesses and households at this time, but also, importantly, sends a clear message to the Government that we are doing everything we can to support ourselves to address the city's growth challenges. Sending this signal to Government will be critical if we want to maximise the amount of Government investment into the sub-region.

We do not support the reduction in the Uniform Annual General Charge to 10% due to the effect that it appears to have on business rates. We note the average increase for commercial rates is proposed to be 21.8%, a combination of the planned increase to the differential and the UAGC change. We do not consider this effect to have been well communicated in advance. We encourage any delayed payment mechanisms that you might be able to offer distressed commercial tenants.

We support increasing the commercial rates differential to 1:1.2 as outlined in the LTP. The commercial sector tends to benefit more from investing in future growth, through spending on infrastructure, transport and land supply. Our view of differentials is as communicated in past years – it is a blunt mechanism that has unintended consequences and does not provide an adequate link between payment and service. Targeted rates would be more effective and likely to benefit TCC alongside businesses.

Alternative funding mechanisms

It is essential that Tauranga City Council invest in the city's future to support economic and community prosperity and to attract skilled workers and the businesses that need them, while also maintaining the city's financial sustainability. We encourage Council to consider all avenues for alternate funding, such as targeted rates, or private sector investment into large scale infrastructure projects. We also encourage Council to expedite opportunities to establish off balance sheet entities to manage large assets such as water and urban development.

The structure of local government funding in NZ is sub-optimal. Rather than continue the same path that has led to difficulty balancing the rates / debt equation, it is essential that TCC takes active moves to change the system that it currently operates in as the city grows.

Regional collaboration and leadership

Priority One supports the Tauranga City Council's leadership role in the delivery of SmartGrowth initiatives (including UFTI), working closely with Bay of Plenty Regional Council, Western Bay of Plenty District Council and tangata whenua in the implementation of the strategy. Tauranga City Council has an important and valued role in leading the response to regional growth.

The Western Bay sub-region continues to be widely recognised as a leader in integrated long-term planning as well as demonstrating leadership and foresight to central Government, giving them

confidence that the sub-region is developing in a sustainable and future-focused manner. It is essential to the future of Tauranga that we continue to undertake the collaborative leadership that is at the heart of a sustainable community, and that we invest in its implementation.

SUMMARY

We submit that it is essential that Tauranga City Council implement a rates increase of 7.6% in the upcoming financial year. We believe this is necessary to ensure the Council does its bit to support the region's economic recovery by continuing to invest in critical strategic infrastructure.

Priority One appreciates Tauranga City Council's support of our organisation. Like you, we have immense pride in Tauranga and want to see it develop in an inclusive and sustainable way, that enables everyone in our community to share in the region's prosperity. We look forward to working with you to find solutions to the challenges that the city is facing that are fair, smart, forward looking and sustainable.

SUBMISSION TO TAURANGA CITY COUNCIL'S DRAFT ANNUAL PLAN 2020-21

SUMMARY OF SUBMISSION

This submission:

- Supports the proposed overall rates increase of 4.7% in the 2020-21 year.
- Urges Council to prioritise infrastructure spending to create economic stimulus and flow-on benefit to assist the city recover from the economic impact of Covid-19. We note this is the single most important thing Council can do to aid in the recovery and to keep members of our community in employment.
- Strongly supports Council to consider alternative ways to fund infrastructure and get debt off Council's balance sheet, i.e. greater use of targeted rates; private sector investment and/or establishing separate entities to manage assets such as water.
- Supports Council's leadership role in the delivery of collaborative initiatives such as SmartGrowth and UFTI, noting the importance of collaboration with other local authorities to ensure the future sustainability of our sub-regional community and economy. These initiatives help maintain central Government confidence in the region and provide investment confidence to the private sector. They are also critical elements for the city and region to remain competitive in the attraction of new business and talent.

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Domestically, the Level 4 lockdown (26th March-27th April), meant many businesses were unable to operate and consequently face significant impacts on their cashflow, meaning the economy has taken a very sharp dip. The NZ government's Wage Subsidy Scheme has been accessed by the majority of local businesses and has helped alleviate short term cashflow issues and allow businesses to retain staff, however as the wage subsidy comes to an end, we are likely to see more redundancies in the most affected sectors such as tourism, retail, and hospitality. We also expect some redundancies in the construction sector as lower consumer and business confidence reduces the forward pipeline of work. Fiscal stimulus, including Council infrastructure spend will aid longer term recovery if targeted to the right areas.

In the Western Bay sub-region, we are fortunate that our large sectors (horticulture, food manufacturing, health and education), with the exception of construction, were able to continue operating under lockdown, albeit at reduced capacity. At this stage the outlook for our main industries is reasonable due to the strong position our economy was in prior to lockdown. The sub-region has the potential to come out of the recession better than many other regions and to date consumer spending has rebounded strongly. Despite this, we expect the secondary effects of the shock to be more present later in the year with lower business and consumer confidence and credit issues leading to reduced spend, investment and solvency issues.

In a recession the community needs Council to be a strong player. Retrenchment of operating or capital expenditure will be highly negative to economic recovery. That is why we support the rates increase in this environment.

SUBMISSION

Infrastructure investment

We strongly support Council's core role in continuing to fund infrastructure where this investment is targeted towards areas of strategic significance such as Te Papa Peninsula intensification, Tauriko, Te Tumu, Rangiuru and roading around the Port. From a Priority One perspective we will also be focussing efforts into projects that directly support our labour market. Investment into these areas will be crucial for us as we recover from our economic troubles.

In very difficult times like these, Council's continued investment into strategic infrastructure is the single biggest thing Council can do to help mitigate the impacts of recession.

Proposed rates increase

The Draft 2020-21 Annual Plan acknowledges Council's growth related funding challenges and proposes an overall rates increase of 4.7%, a reduction on the 7.6% overall rates increase originally proposed by Council. We support the reduction in the proposed increase as it strikes a balance between recognising the economic challenges being felt by businesses and households at this time, but also, importantly, sends a clear message to the Government that we are doing everything we can to support ourselves to address the city's growth challenges. Sending this signal to Government will be critical if we want to maximise the amount of Government investment into the sub-region.

We do not support the reduction in the Uniform Annual General Charge to 10% due to the effect that it appears to have on business rates. We note the average increase for commercial rates is proposed to be 21.8%, a combination of the planned increase to the differential and the UAGC change. We do not consider this effect to have been well communicated in advance. We encourage any delayed payment mechanisms that you might be able to offer distressed commercial tenants.

We support increasing the commercial rates differential to 1:1.2 as outlined in the LTP. The commercial sector tends to benefit more from investing in future growth, through spending on infrastructure, transport and land supply. Our view of differentials is as communicated in past years – it is a blunt mechanism that has unintended consequences and does not provide an adequate link between payment and service. Targeted rates would be more effective and likely to benefit TCC alongside businesses.

We note comparisons to other NZ cities and acknowledge that commercial rates lag, as do residential rates. We suggest that comparisons of capital value and amenity provided would make an analysis more valid. Captial value would be a useful target to grow in partnership with Tauranga's business community.

Development in Tauranga's CBD is cause for concern. We suggest consideration is given to assistance that can be applied to this area around rates in the short term, and incentivisation for development in the longer term.

Alternative funding mechanisms

It is essential that Tauranga City Council invest in the city's future to support economic and community prosperity and to attract skilled workers and the businesses that need them, while also maintaining the city's financial sustainability. We encourage Council to consider all avenues for alternate funding, such as targeted rates, or private sector investment into large scale infrastructure projects. We also encourage Council to expedite opportunities to establish off balance sheet entities to manage large assets such as water and urban development.

The structure of local government funding in NZ is sub-optimal. Rather than continue the same path that has led to difficulty balancing the rates / debt equation, it is essential that TCC takes active moves to change the system that it currently operates in as the city grows. We believe there is opportunity to engage the private sector in strategic investments.

Regional collaboration and leadership

Priority One supports the Tauranga City Council's leadership role in the delivery of SmartGrowth initiatives (including UFTI), working closely with Bay of Plenty Regional Council, Western Bay of Plenty District Council and tangata whenua in the implementation of the strategy. Tauranga City Council has an important and valued role in leading the response to regional growth.

The Western Bay sub-region continues to be widely recognised as a leader in integrated long-term planning as well as demonstrating leadership and foresight to central Government, giving them confidence that the sub-region is developing in a sustainable and future-focused manner. It is essential to the future of Tauranga that we continue to undertake the collaborative leadership that is at the heart of a sustainable community, and that we invest in its implementation.

SUMMARY

We submit that it is essential that Tauranga City Council implement a rates increase of 4.7% in the upcoming financial year. We believe this is necessary to ensure the Council does its bit to support the region's economic recovery by continuing to invest in critical strategic infrastructure. We believe that the UAGC change could be softened to reduce negative effects on businesses and therefore employment.

Priority One appreciates Tauranga City Council's support of our organisation. Like you, we have immense pride in Tauranga and want to see it develop in an inclusive and sustainable way, that enables everyone in our community to share in the region's prosperity. We look forward to working with you to find solutions to the challenges that the city is facing that are fair, smart, forward looking and sustainable.

Re Tourism: developing numbers and income Post Pandemic. 'Go Local'

Tauranga and the BOP's tourist numbers and income have been severely reduced since our borders have been closed to overseas visitors and internal travel/Air NZ curtailed with lockdown. Tourism has ceased to exist in NZ.

When internal travel is freely permitted with no 'associating' restrictions what will Tauranga/BOP have to offer visitors?

With the completion of the 130+km BOP Coastal Cycle Trail this year, I wish to promote the potential of tourist cycling in the City and Region. We have so much to offer.

Let me explain. I and many others hop on a plane to the South Island to cycle their trails. I've a friend who has done this with his friends now for 24 years. 'Best holidays we've enjoyed.' There's wonderful trails there as you'll see in the AA book. Shuttles, bike hire, accomodation, cafes and restaurants— a whole successful industry. And with electric bikes you don't even have to raise a sweat!

Wonderful bike trails all around NZ from Cape Reinga To Bluff! Except....Councillors.... Tauranga/BOP.

We don't get a mention. At present we have nothing to offer.

But by end of this year we potentially will have a world. class 130+ km Coastal trail involving the Ocean, Estuaries, Lakes and Rivers in a region with warm waters, surfing and swimming, and 2 months extra summer than the South Island. The 'Omokoroa to Paengaroa Trail', to eventually connect up with the National cycle trail network.

Our neighbouring WBOPC has committed funds to bring their Hauraki Rail Trail from Miranda and Thames and Matamata to Omokoroa.

The details;

- 1). the Omokoroa to Gordon Carmichael Reserve Trail requires completion of the clip-on cycle track over the Wairoa bridge -1/3 complete and a safe cycle trail connection up the hill to Bethlehem.
- 2) The storm water drainage project at Papamoa East between Stevenson Rd and the Kaituna River will allow a cycle trail to connect over the Bridge onto the WBOPC trails through Maketu to Paengaroa and beyond to complete the 130+ km Trail.

That's the bones of it.

And it will go through our City from end to end with so many exciting, sporting and attractive interests for biking visitors, with great opportunities for generating accommodation and hospitality Tourist Dollars.

And the dreaded blockage to safe cycling which presently. exists at the Bayfair crossing...Hallelujah...with an underpass will be no more.

So what am I here for with my submission?

To ask you to recognise the great tourist potential of a safe, signed cycle trail through the city by the end of the year

and to allocate funds for it.

Cycling is the gender equal, all ages, sporting activity now With electric bikes to take all the effort out of pedalling. When lockdown eases New Zealanders will be seeking to cycle in easy to access, attractive locations.

Australian tourists too. Tauranga can and must make itself That Place to build the Tourism dollar, give employment to those who've been hit in the guts by Covid19.

Let me sell the sizzle. Consider our new, magnificent Airport. From around NZ you could fly in with your bike, unpack and assemble it at the convenient biker's area with its sheltered bike stands, tools, pump with full biking information and maps.

From the airport it's a 15 minute ride to the Strand, CBD, waterside attractions, food and coffee. And that's over the road bridge with arguably the very best views in town. Or 10 minutes to the Mount, Pilot Bay and Ocean Beach. I claim no other town has such attractive and accessible Facilities.

Councillors, a safe and signed cycleway though Tauranga will be an essential part of the BOP Coastal Cycle Trail to be completed by the end of the year and an essential part of Tauranga's Tourist industry and commercial success.

6.9 Wairakei

- 6.9.1 The Wairakei Urban Growth Area is located towards the eastern end of Papamoa. The Local Development Contributions are payable on a per (gross) hectare basis and are calculated by dividing the total costs for each activity by the number of (gross) hectares.
- 6.9.2 Each hectare of land is treated equally regardless of underlying zoning. The justification for this is that local infrastructure costs are primarily determined by the land area to be serviced as opposed to the underlying infrastructure demand (i.e. usage) generated by different types of land uses (e.g. residential, commercial and industrial).
- 6.9.3 Wairakei has been separated into three different stormwater catchments, Area A, Area B and Area C as shown on the attached map Figure 2. In Area B most stormwater infrastructure is developer funded. In Areas A and C stormwater infrastructure is funded by development contributions and consequently the per hectare rates are higher in these areas than they are in Area B.
- 6.9.4 At the time this Policy became operative:
 - The boundary between Areas A and B was the boundary of Lot 2 DPS 24826 (Area B) with Lot 3 DPS 82613, Lot 1 DP 429801 and Section 4 SO 410927 (Area A) and the boundary of Section 4 SO 428937 (Area B) with Section 4 SO 410937 (Area A),
 - The exact boundary between Area B and Area C had not been determined. Further work will be undertaken to define this boundary accurately prior to development being undertaken within close vicinity of this boundary.
- 6.9.5 The planning period for the area is 2011-2036.
- 6.9.6 The total land area used in the divisors is as follows:

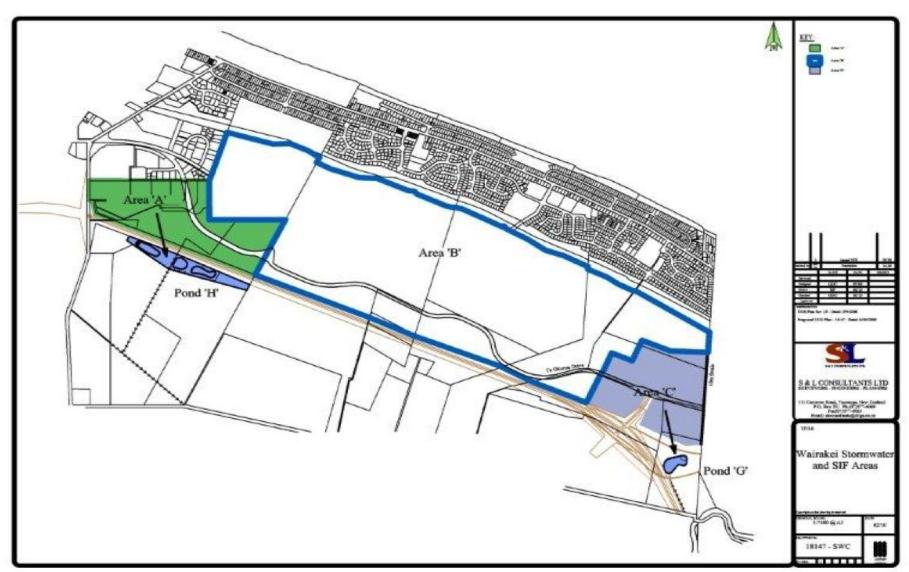

INTRODUCTION

1. Summerset Group Holdings Limited (*Summerset*) is pleased to have the opportunity to submit on the Draft Development Contributions Policy 2020-2021 (*Policy*) proposed by Tauranga City Council (*Council*).

BACKGROUND

- 2. Summerset is New Zealand's second largest developer and third largest operator of retirement villages, which makes it one of New Zealand's largest home-builders. Summerset currently operates 26 villages across New Zealand and provides a range of living options for more than 5,200 residents.
- 3. Summerset develops and operates comprehensive care retirement villages, that provide a continuum of care, with its villages containing independent (villas, townhouses and apartments) and assisted living units and residential care (rest home, hospital and dementia level care) for those who require greater assistance. The average age of a resident entering Summerset's villages is 81 years. This resident demographic is associated with a typically low pattern of demand on community infrastructure, amenities and facilities.
- 4. Over the next 50 years the number of people over 75 in New Zealand is expected to grow by 245% from 315,000 in 2018 (6% of the population) to more than one million in 2068 (17% of the population). It is therefore vital that the regulatory environment recognises and provides for the development that is required to meet this growing demand, and funding for associated infrastructure, but does so on a fair and proportionate basis.

LOWER OCCUPANCY AND DEMAND PROFILE

- 5. Summerset considers that the Policy fails to take into account the characteristics of comprehensive care retirement villages and their occupants that, on their own or cumulatively with those of other developments, substantially reduce the impacts of development on requirements for infrastructure and community facilities in the city or parts of the city both at a citywide and local area level.
- 6. "Retirement village" is an umbrella term given to all types of retirement living, encompassing both "comprehensive care" and "lifestyle" retirement villages.
 - 6.1. As discussed above, comprehensive care retirement villages provide a full range of living and care options from independent living through to assisted living, rest home, hospital and memory care (dementia). The residential care component makes up a relatively high percentage of the overall unit mix.
 - 6.2. Lifestyle retirement villages focus mostly on independent living units with occasionally a small amount of serviced care on a largely temporary basis. When a resident becomes frail over time, usually they would be forced to move from a lifestyle village. This is because care provision is minimal and not suitable as a long-term solution.
- 7. There is a fundamental difference between a comprehensive care retirement village (as Summerset's new villages are) and a lifestyle retirement village. Each village attracts a very different resident demographic. As discussed above, the average age of a resident entering Summerset's villages is 81 years. For completed and fully occupied villages, the average age across all residents is closer to mid 80s. Residents are typically people that chose to live in their own homes for as long as possible and moved to a retirement village primarily due to a specific need (such as deteriorating health or mobility challenges, or for companionship many of Summerset's residents are widows). By contrast, lifestyle villages cater for a younger, more active early retiree, with a higher proportion of couples. The average age of a resident moving into a lifestyle village is more mid-to-late 60s.
- 8. Summerset's villages typically provide an extensive range of on-site amenities that are suited to the older residents' specialist physical and social needs including on-demand mini-vans for residents' shopping and outings, a bar, café and restaurant, small residents' convenience shop, pool, gym, activities room, pool table, piano, hairdressing and beauty salon, treatment room, bowling green, hobbies shed, meeting rooms, theatre, library, communal sitting and lounge areas, residents' vegetable gardens and large park-like landscaped gardens. These on-site amenities greatly reduce and in some cases eliminate usage of Council's community amenities and facilities by Summerset's residents.
- 9. Summerset's average occupancy for its independent units is 1.3 residents per unit regardless of the number of bedrooms in the unit. Summerset's average occupancy for its care units is 1 resident per unit. The reduced occupancy per unit and reduced demand per occupant results in a reduced demand on both local infrastructure and community facilities when compared against the demand assumptions for a typical household unit.
- 10. Summerset notes that the reduced occupancy, and demand per occupant, for comprehensive care retirement villages has been thoroughly tested and is now provided for by Auckland Council which has defined "Retirement Villages" in the Auckland Unitary Plan and its Development

- Contributions Policy. This approach recognises the reduced demand placed on local infrastructure and community amenities.
- 11. Summerset considers that Council, in developing the Policy, has not given adequate consideration to the unique characteristics of comprehensive care retirement villages, and the significantly lower demand profile when compared to a standard residential development, particularly due to:
 - 11.1. lower occupancy levels (1.3 residents per independent unit and 1 resident per care unit, compared to 2.5 residents per standard residential dwelling assumed in the Policy);
 - 11.2. reduced activity levels of the residents due to their age and frailty; and
 - 11.3. the provision of specialist on-site amenities provided to cater for the residents' specific needs.

POLICY NOT FAIR AND PROPORTIONATE

- 12. The Policy treats retirement villages as a residential activity, and distinguishes between the portion of a retirement village where medical support is provided, and the independent living units.
 - 12.1. Where 24 hour on site medical support to residents is provided, contributions are calculated on the basis of a household equivalent unit, being the number of occupants a building is designed or licensed to accommodate divided by 2.5 persons. This avoids each aged care room being treated as its own household equivalent unit.
 - 12.2. For independent living units, the Policy provides that a one bedroom dwelling includes a household unit in a retirement village. A one bedroom dwelling attracts 0.5 units of demand (an assumption of 1.25 persons).
- 13. The Policy therefore provides for a lower occupancy rate of retirement units and aged care rooms as compared to standard residential dwellings. However, the Policy does not account for:
 - 13.1. the unique characteristics of comprehensive care retirement villages, as compared to lifestyle retirement villages;
 - 13.2. the demographic characteristics of retirement unit and aged care room residents; or
 - 13.3. the extensive on-site amenities and facilities provided by comprehensive care retirement village operators.
- 14. In summary, the Policy allows for a population per unit discount, but not a demand factor discount to reflect the residents' demographic and on-site facilities. For example, the Policy assumes that a person residing in an aged care room requiring 24 hour on site hospital level medical support will place the same demand on community facilities such as reserves and libraries as a person living independently in the community.

RELIEF SOUGHT

- 15. To fairly account for the lower demand profile, both a population per unit discount (to account for the lower occupancy) and a demand factor discount (to account for the older demographic and on-site amenities) should be applied to contribution calculations for comprehensive care retirement villages.
- 16. Summerset requests that a separate rate is set for retirement villages, consistent with development contribution policies being developed by other councils. This should distinguish retirement units, and aged care rooms, and provide separate rates for each.
- 17. Water and Wastewater contributions should be assessed according to the demand factors for comprehensive care retirement villages calculated and agreed with Council at resource consent stage against those assumed for typical household equivalent units to recognise the lower demand on those reticulated services.
- 18. Stormwater contributions should be assessed according to the demand factors for comprehensive care retirement villages based on the site-specific stormwater management outlined and agreed with Council at resource consent stage. Council need to clearly demonstrate the causal connection between any public stormwater infrastructure required as a result of the increase in demand (if any) directly attributable by the retirement village.
- 19. Taking into account both population per unit/room, and demand factors, Summerset suggests the rates in the table below. These are based on the equivalent rates in the current Auckland Council development contribution policy, which were established after robust hearings processes including the calling of expert evidence in relation to demand.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS AND TIMING

- 20. Summerset notes that the draft Policy (at paragraph 2.7) refers to specific thresholds (50% below, or 100% above) being required before Council will consider undertaking a special assessment. Summerset disagrees with the need to specify thresholds and instead submits that where it is evident from the resource consent application that a proposal is likely to have lesser demand on infrastructure then a special assessment may be requested by the applicant.
- 21. Summerset submits that the Policy should be explicit about the assessment and timing of payment for large staged projects that require both land use resource consent(s) and building consent(s). Summerset submits that where both a land use resource consent and a building consent are required, the activity should be assessed for development contributions based on

the relevant Policy applicable at the time that the resource consent application is lodged, with payment of the total assessed development contributions staged such that a proportionate amount is payable prior to uplift of the code compliance certificates for each staged building consent. That manner of assessment and payment is fair and reasonable and gives developers certainty of the development contributions payable on large, staged projects such as comprehensive care retirement villages.

- 22. Section 2.8.4 of the Policy provides that development contributions on land use consents are payable "prior to commencement of the land use permitted by the resource consent". Summerset requests clarification of section 2.8.4 of the Policy as follows, in line with the above approach.
 - 22.1. Where a building consent is required to be issued for the development proposed, then "commencement of the land use permitted by the resource consent" should be expressly linked to the issue of associated code compliance certificate(s). That is the point at which the land use could lawfully "commence" without breaching the Building Act. Given occupancy is permitted at that point, it is also the time at which any additional demand on Council infrastructure would arise. In a larger staged development, this may mean a series of payments over time as the building work under each staged building consent is completed and signed off.
 - 22.2. While section 2.8.4 relates to the timing of payment, it should be clarified that in terms of the timing of the assessment and the version of the policy that applies, the development contributions would be calculated and set at the time of land use consent but payable at the time of code compliance certificate(s).

FINAL COMMENTS

- 23. At the time of writing this submission there is a great degree of economic uncertainty created by the novel Covid-19 virus. It is widely expected that an economic downturn (recession) will result from the impact of the virus on economic activity and it is likely to result in a significant increase in unemployment across New Zealand.
- 24. It should be noted that comprehensive care retirement villages typically represent an approximate \$100 \$200 million investment in the local area providing jobs and significant flow-on economic benefits to the local community through the construction phase. Once the village is operational it is expected to directly create 30-50 full time equivalent local jobs in the village, as well as many more jobs indirectly through demand on local suppliers being used to provide goods and services required to operate the village.
- 25. Given the current economic uncertainty and the resulting desire to stimulate economic development, Summerset asks Council to rethink its proposal to increase development contribution rates under its draft Policy.

27. Summerset is grateful for the opportunity to submit on the Policy, and looks forward to engaging with the Council during the consultation process. Summerset would be happy to meet with the Council or attend at a hearing to discuss this submission further if that would assist.

SUBMISSION TO DRAFT TCC ANNUAL PLAN 2020/21 ANNEXURE

Following on from our presentation to Council in Public Forum on 19 May 2020 we note the draft revised Annual Plan is currently being reviewed by TCC Councillors. We feel it would be prudent and opportune to therefore remind all Elected Members of our position on rates rises and associated matters and to that end we enclose further copy of the Referendum Request to help focus Elected Members on the following issues involved.

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1 The Zero rates rise/no rates rise/rates freeze initiative or as we would prefer to call it the retention of the rating status quo with no change in rates by holding the existing rates from last year and carry those forward to 2020/2021 rating year. This course of action would mean ratepayers both residential and commercial would receive the same rating demand as last year showing the same amount of rates.

We request Council to scrap the proposed 4.7% overall rates rise and the 1:1.2 Commercial differential rating.

You should note that the last TCC wide revaluation was undertaken on 1 July 2018 so this would not affect the calculation or assessment of current rates.

Developers should of course be fully paying their way up front with no deferral of payments for infrastructure etc.

It is noted this is the rating approach apparently taken by BOPRC when signaling a no rates increase.

2. The proposed reduction of the Uniform Annual Charge from \$475 to \$296 (about 20% to 10%) must be canned and cancelled permanently as it is inequitable, seeking simply to rob the asset rich as opposed to income rich to pay for the asset poor who some assume are also income poor.

It does not take into account that every property no matter what its value has exactly the same access to and use of TCC facilities. The proper way to

address this issue is to beef up the Council rate relief scheme for genuine low income earners and elderly people with limited income along with strict means testing. Current Rating values are already penalizing the highest valued properties and they pay significantly higher rates now than the lowest valued properties sometimes over 8 times as much e.g. \$1731 vs. \$13500 plus per annum in rates. Surely this speaks volumes for itself so just retain the existing UAGC charges and scrap this ideological nonsense.

3 .The proposed compulsory Council Rubbish Collection Service for every ratepayer, proposed to be run by TCC must be abandoned immediately as it has no place in the equation at any point in time. There has been no proper public consultation on the inane proposals and the likely \$9 million spend up on new rubbish bins is obscenely expensive, unjustified and quite unnecessary. It is clearly the case of applying the old adage "If it ain't broke don't touch it" particularly having regards to TCC's terrible track record on running any business operations it becomes involved with.

Any rating increase in the current COVID environment and having regards to citizens straitened circumstances would be abhorrent. Any increase no matter how insignificant simply looks like an attempt by some in Council to save face against the call for a COVID rates freeze and a points-scoring exercise. Our Prime Minister said "Be kind, Be fair". Council should take note of this request. A rates freeze is the need, anything less would be morally unconscionable. Just cut the Council cloth to suit and get on with doing what is proper and right by TCC Ratepayers.

The pitiful staff initial attempt to make rats and mice savings on things like Robbins Park tropical house, CBD hanging baskets, the crazy Our Place project or TCC Events and so forth totalling only around \$1.2million of the \$12million required to achieve the savings target was ludicrous.

What needs to be addressed are major items like the Elizabeth Street upgrade project (appears public blind sided with no consultation) for benefit of Farmers only who it seems may no longer be completing the full residential development anyway- exactly what was this Council deal and the carrot offered to Farmers. The cost has rocketed from about \$3m to \$20.4m. Steps need to be taken to stop this fiscal madness as along with the recent Durham Street upgrade and the new current Wharf Street upgrade it should never have been on the radar or seen the light of day anyway. Investigative work on The Strand Extension upgrade project also needs to be stopped.

However the main subject that needs to be addressed urgently are TCC staff numbers and wage levels that increased by around 9.7% in the past year and the new Councillor remuneration packages increased early this year. All need to be

pared back to the previous levels.

To this end TCC need to have an immediate full staff and systems independent audit on staff numbers, wages, systems and all related significant costs with a view to making savings of up to 30% or \$20million. It seems the Auckland Super City Council have grasped the nettle and are seriously looking at these issues.

With respect could we remind you, that in the 28th May 2020 Agenda, staff responded to Councils request to consider the Referendum options for inclusion in the Annual Plan consultation papers by making the statement that if the Council decided to re-consult (which it has done), information on the topics raised would be included in the revised draft Plan. The parties to the Referendum Request and the hundreds of residents who backed them expect Council staff and Council to honour that undertaking in a balanced and unbiased manner. The failure to give due consideration to the issues raised may well result in social unrest.

Tauranga City Council Draft Development Contributions Policy 2020/21

Background:

The Ministry of Education (the Ministry) is the Government's lead advisor on the New Zealand education system, shaping direction for education agencies and providers and contributing to the Government's goals for education. The Ministry has responsibility for all education property owned by the Crown. This involves managing the existing property portfolio, upgrading and improving the portfolio, purchasing and constructing new property to meet increased demand, identifying and disposing of surplus State school sector property and managing teacher and caretaker housing. The Ministry is therefore a considerable stakeholder in terms of educational facilities and assets in the Tauranga City area and has a strong interest in the provision for educational facilities within the Tauranga City area in general.

The Ministry's submission on the Draft Development Contributions Policy 2020/21 is:

The Ministry understands the need for Tauranga City Council (TCC) to fund growth-related capital expenditure as the city grows. The Ministry considers that the provision of social infrastructure is just as important as the provision of physical infrastructure in ensuring that new development can be provided to satisfy the basic needs of a community. In this role, the Ministry plays a key part in contributing to the development of liveable and prosperous communities.

Under the Draft Development Contributions Policy, schools and other education facilities are defined as a 'Business Activity' and are therefore required to pay for Citywide Development Contributions and Local Development Contributions. Under Draft Development Contributions Policy 2020/21, 'Business Activity' means:

"the use of land and buildings for business purposes in accordance with the provisions of the Tauranga City Plan or resource consent. It also includes the use of land and buildings for visitor accommodation purposes, or for purposes that are not principally for commercial gain but

provide employment (this includes but is not limited to schools and other educational facilities, public hospitals, police and fire stations and not-for-profit or voluntary organisations)".

The Ministry does not consider the 'Business Activity' classification is an accurate reflection of the actual demand schools have on infrastructure. For example, consideration has not been given to the fact that school toilets are not used for approximately 165 days of a year. It also does not take into account that schools only use approximately 2.3% of the amount of water as an average household.

The Ministry recognise that, if a 'business' is likely to have a significantly lesser impact on infrastructure than the anticipated average demand on which the Citywide Development Contributions are based, a special assessment may be undertaken at the discretion of TCC to determine the amount of Citywide Development Contributions payable. However, the Ministry note that the use of this mechanism is at the discretion of TCC and does not apply to Local Development Contributions.

The Ministry therefore considers that the classification of 'Low Demand Business Activity' is a more accurate reflection of the use of infrastructure by schools and other educational facilities and is more in line with the definition of a low demand business activity, being:

"the use of land and buildings for the purposes of storage, warehousing, distribution or the operation of utility networks in circumstances where Council is satisfied that the proposed activity will have a relatively minor impact on its water and wastewater network on a per m² gross floor area basis relative to the impact of an average business activity as measured on the same basis".

The Ministry seeks the following decision from the consent authority:

Given the limited operating hours and minimal use of water by schools and other educational facilities, the Ministry requests that TCC include schools and other education facilities as a 'Low Demand Business Activity'.

The Ministry also seeks close collaboration with TCC and considers that this collaboration between TCC and the Ministry will be crucial to the timely and effective provision of schools within Tauranga City.

The Ministry welcomes any opportunity to discuss this approach further with TCC. Should you wish to discuss any aspect of this feedback please do not hesitate to contact the undersigned as consultant to the Ministry.

The Ministry wish to be heard in support of their submission. If others make a similar submission, the Ministry would consider presenting a joint case with them at the hearing.

1. Introduction

- 1.1. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Council's draft Development Contributions Policy 2020-2021.
- 1.2. This feedback is from Woolworths New Zealand Limited ("Woolworths").
- 1.3. By way of background, Woolworths is one of New Zealand's leading supermarket operators. Supermarkets serve an essential support function for domestic living, as well as providing an important economic function through competition (lowering the price of food and groceries and improving the offering to customers) and as a source of local employment. In the context of planning and urban form, supermarkets contribute to a sense of place for centres, commercial areas and new communities, encouraging additional investment in those locales across the District.
- 1.4. Woolworths currently operates 181 Countdown supermarkets throughout New Zealand, as well as distribution centres, a meat processing plant, warehouse operations and a large support office. Woolworths is also the franchisor for both the FreshChoice and SuperValue supermarket brands. Woolworths is the second largest private sector employer in New Zealand, employing around 20,000 people.
- 1.5. Within the Tauranga City Council's jurisdiction, Woolworths has seven Countdown supermarkets, one FreshChoice and one SuperValue. Woolworths is also looking to develop new stores and redevelop existing stores across the District. This interest will consequently increase employment opportunities and investment in the District.
- 1.6. Given Woolworths' significant past and planned further investment in the District, and having specific regard to catalysing new growth and investment, the contents of the Development Contributions Policy ("DC Policy" or "the Policy") will be integral to the continuing operation and development of Woolworths' activities in Tauranga.

2. Covid-19

- 2.1. At the outset, Woolworths considers it is prudent to highlight that the economic climate within which this feedback is now sought is materially different from the climate in which this DC Policy was drafted.
- 2.2. In a very short space of time, Covid-19 has severely impacted the New Zealand economy, and it is likely there will be disruption for months, if not years. To this end, in our view, it is critical that the country work together to remove barriers to economic growth and development as we all work towards kickstarting the economy and avoiding economic downturn.
- 2.3. As such, Woolworths advocates for a freeze on DC increases for this next financial year. In our view, the proposed increase by 16% to the City-wide component of the DC Policy is significantly out of step with the current economic forecast and is likely to negatively impact investment opportunities.
- 2.4. Notwithstanding this, Woolworths makes the following more general comments regarding the DC Policy.

3. Transparency and Fairness

- 3.1. Woolworths supports the overall intent of funding growth through development contributions as it provides a fair and equitable mechanism that is directly attributable to the additional demand that a development will place on local and regional infrastructure.
- 3.2. Woolworths seeks to ensure that the contribution per unit of demand is sufficient to account for the actual demand that is generated by the additional HUE, and that the methodology for determining this is transparent.
- 3.3. Further, there should be consideration given to the ways in which DCs can be varied relative to the activity rather than a generic gross floor area or HUE application. For example, a supermarket with good public transport links, proximity to centres and residential communities should command a lower transport DC than one more remotely located or inaccessible by alternative modes of transport than the private vehicle.
- 3.4. Finally, the suggestion in the DC Policy that the City-wide DC is expected to increase significantly in 2022 is wholly unacceptable without detailed explanation for the increase, and as highlighted above, will be a significant hurdle for development and investment in a post-lockdown climate. The Policy references that the Council is "considering options to fund a number of planned community facilities" as one of the reasons for the increase. At this point in time, it is considered inappropriate to take that approach.

4. Double-dipping

- 4.1. In Woolworths's extensive experience of developing large-scale retail activities, which are categorised as high-traffic generating activities, it has found that it is often required to contribute to the cost of transport infrastructure upgrades or amendments in addition to the payment of transport-related DCs. In other words, the effects of the activity may be mitigated through transport infrastructure works under the resource consent process (and under the Resource Management Act). However, the calculation of DCs payable for that same development does not often incorporate any credit for that investment in mitigation works when determining the demand (and associated cost on infrastructure) arising from that consented activity. This results in "double-dipping" in respect of paying for development costs, and adversely affects the feasibility of Woolworths' investment.
- 4.2. The DC Policy includes the provision for Council to undertake a special assessment "at the discretion of Council" to determine the amount of DCs payable (2.7.3). However, section 2.7.4 qualifies this process stating it will only occur if the demand on which the DC is based is either 50% below or 100% above the anticipated average demand. Woolworths considers there ought to be more flexibility as to when "special assessments" are undertaken.
- 4.3. To illustrate, and in the case of Tauriko, the "Tauriko for Tomorrow" project, which combines efforts by Tauranga City Council, the Western Bay of Plenty District Council, the Bay of Plenty Regional Council and the New Zealand Transport Agency ("the Transport Agency"), significant funds have been pooled for the various infrastructure upgrades identified as necessary to support growth in the area. However, due to reevaluation of the wider project in 2018, those works have been delayed and the Tauranga City Council has been required to fund short-term improvements to enable development and growth within Tauriko.
- 4.4. However, clearly at some point the planned integrated works will come online, yet in the interim developers will have covered the cost themselves at the higher DC rates proposed by this Policy.
- 4.5. To illustrate further, the Pyes Pa West costs per lot have decreased and the DC Policy states this is due to funding from the Transport Agency having been received retrospectively.

5. City-wide DCs

5.1 The stated reason for increasing the City-wide DC by 16% includes reference to risk allowances and a general trend in contractor costs or margins. Given the points made in section 2 of this feedback, this is considered inappropriate and a far more conservative contingency should be adopted, if any increase is to be applied at all.

6. Tauriko DCs

6.1. The DC Policy seeks to increase Tauriko's local DC fees by nearly 6%, ostensibly to cover the revised wastewater infrastructure upgrade proposals. The Policy is not clear on whether the revisions benefit all or only some of the catchment in question. Nor is it clear how the funding proportions have been calculated, noting there is a reliance on "expected wastewater flows from Tauriko compared to other areas of future development". Woolworths requests clarification and maintains that the projected DC increase is likely unnecessary in its generic application, and results in adverse effects on catalysing development within an identified growth area such as Tauriko.

7. Timing of Payment

- 7.1. The DC Policy states that DCs will be required on a building consent, certificate of acceptance, authorisation for service connection or land use resource consent at Council's discretion (section 2.3.2(c) and (d)).
- 7.2. However, section 2.8.4 then clarifies that for DCs required in respect of a land use consent, the DC is payable prior to the commencement of the land use permitted by the resource consent or such other time as specified in an advice note to that consent.
- 7.3. In respect of Woolworths' developments, the timing of paying a significant sum is critical to the feasibility of that development and those milestones noted above vary considerably relative to potential funding or sale and purchase of land.
- 7.4. Woolworths therefore suggests that DCs ought to be payable at one specific point in time, rather than allowing it to Council's discretion, and that preferred point of time is upon completion of the development and just prior to occupation. This is the point at which the costs of development will be incurred, for example use of the transport or wastewater networks.

8. Relief Sought

- 8.1. Woolworths respectfully seeks amendments to the DC Policy to resolve the matters raised in this feedback.
- 8.2. Woolworths would welcome the opportunity to be heard in respect of its feedback.
- 8.3. Thank you for the opportunity to make these comments on the draft DC Policy 2020-2021.

As a key stakeholder of ours, I wanted to update you on the impact of COVID-19 on the play, active recreation and sport sector, and to seek your ongoing support as we collectively focus on the significant task ahead – that of the social and economic recovery of our country.

The impact of COVID-19 on the play, active recreation and sport sector

It is clear that the economic impacts of COVID-19 will be severe. We know that traditional income sources for many individuals and organisations, will be under unprecedented pressure for some time.

For sport and recreation organisations, one of the biggest impacts has been the significant disruption to income from Class 4 gaming. Community sport and recreation benefits from about 50% of the approximate \$300 million annual funding from this source. Disruption to Class 4 funding has had an immediate and significant impact.

If these organisations have no option but to succumb to COVID-19, the impact on the sector and on physical activity levels in our communities will be catastrophic. As we know, deprived communities are often the most fragile and hard hit by such events, and they are the ones that can least afford to lose access to play, active recreation and sport.

With this in mind, we would like to acknowledge and thank you for the immediate steps your organisation has taken, to support the play, active recreation and sport sector in your community, who are heavily affected by COVID-19.

Sport New Zealand's response to the crisis

Sport NZ has implemented urgent measures in response to COVID-19 to give immediate relief to a sector in crisis:

- An initial financial commitment of over \$70m was committed until 30 June 2021, with the investment intended to help sustain organisations and their networks;
- A significant number of value in kind measures capability support, technical advice and free business management services have been offered to the entire system.

In addition to immediate support, Sport NZ has been asked to help define a Recovery Package for the Minister of Sport and Recreation, for the play, active recreation and sport sector, as part of Budget 2020. We completed this process last week and are now awaiting the result.

Like all local and central Government organisations, you will be redefining strategy, re-evaluating priorities and grappling with funding pressures. Given this is a crucial time when many impactful decisions will be made, I wanted to make sure you are aware of how critical you are, as a territorial authority, to the play, active recreation and sport system.

Without sustained or increased investment, our sector and communities will suffer, and that will create significant consequences for New Zealanders into the future, resulting in much wider issues for us all to manage.

Introduction

Water Safety Bay of Plenty (WSBoP) would like to inform Tauranga City Council (TCC) on the background to, and priority work streams of the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy. We believe that Tauranga City Council should continue to recognise preventable drowning in Tauranga as a critical community issue which requires a collective response to reduce. In addition, we believe that access to safe water-based activities is essential to personal wellbeing and particularly relevant as we help the community recover post COVID-19.

The over-arching purpose for this submission is to seek a financial contribution and bring awareness to the implementation of the recently finalised Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy. This submission outlines the positive impacts this strategy will have on Tauranga city, by reducing the disproportionate numbers of preventable drownings that are occurring.

More specifically, WSBoP would also like Tauranga City Council to support the implementation of the Bay of Plenty water safety strategy by:

- Continuing to contribute to funding the salary of the Regional Water Safety Strategy Manager, for the implementation of the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy;
- Working in partnership with WSBoP through TCC's Welcoming Communities and Safer Communities programmes and in the development of relationships with local iwi and Māori communities;
- Engaging with the coalition of interested parties already present within the Tauranga community on the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy, and;
- Including water safety messages and documents in its community communications.

Supporting Community Recovery from COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has had significant impact on the community's economy and well-being. We believe the Water Safety Strategy and initiatives supports the recovery of the community's well-being by preventing accidental loss of life.

In-line with the Tauranga City Council's Draft Community Well-being Strategic Plan, specifically key interventions #7 and #8, The Water Safety Bay of Plenty initiative is dedicated to supporting the community's well-being and recovery by encouraging and promoting water sports and activities in a safe way, creating a safer community for all. Given the economic and financial impact COVID-19 has on the community, water-based recreational activities are a great way for the community to achieve a positive well-being.

We also believe this aligns with Central Government's Treasury Living Standards Framework, particularly the Domains of Wellbeing; Environment, Health, and Safety and Security.

We are forecasting an increase in water-based recreational activity given the combination of the community being in lockdown during level 4 and the end of the summer season. This time of year is particularly dangerous given that the water is much colder, but the air temperature is still warm and inviting.

Water Safety Bay of Plenty's initiatives will encourage safety and awareness of the dangers, ultimately encouraging the community to act safety when in, on, or around the water.

Supporting Tauranga City Council's Draft Annual Plan 2020, Safer Communities Strategy and Welcoming Communities Plan

As stated in the Tauranga City Council Draft Annual Plan 2020 document, the local population in the Tauranga City region is set to steadily increase. The dangers around water and with water-based recreational activities, however, remains present. This calls for a sustained investment in water safety initiatives in order to adopt a proactive approach, rather than a reactive one.

Water safety preventable drowning statistics are reactive as they are calculated 'after the fact'. Water Safety Bay of Plenty is pushing a proactive approach in the Tauranga City region as we believe one preventable drowning in the community is one too many. With the population increasing, there will be an increase in boating, swimming, fishing and water sports. By adopting a proactive approach in a multi-channel strategy, we aim to drastically lower the drowning rate in Tauranga even with the increase in population.

By adopting this proactive approach, the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy links directly into supporting TCC's delivery of the Tauranga Western Bay Safer Communities Strategic Plan 2020-2025, more specifically one of the strategies key focus areas: Safety Goal 4. As well as, point 3.1 and 3.3 of the Welcoming Communities Plan. The water safety initiatives in Tauranga and Western Bay of Plenty encourage all newcomers, regardless of culture and background, to understand our water environments and the potential dangers so they can safety participate in all water-based recreational activities.



Preventable Drownings in the Western Bay of Plenty

Sadly, the Bay of Plenty region is overrepresented in New Zealand's drowning statistics and although the preventable drownings for 2019 in the Bay of Plenty were lower than average, the overall 10 year trend is still steadily increasing. Drownings in Tauranga and the Western Bay of Plenty made up a significant proportion of these drownings with 71 preventable drownings 2010-2019 – a rate of 2.3 preventable drowning fatalities per 100,000 of population.

Water Safety New Zealand (WSNZ) has undertaken analysis of preventable drowning data from 2010-2018 for three separate sub-regions in the Bay of Plenty: Eastern Bay of Plenty, Rotorua Lakes and Western Bay of Plenty. Key points from this analysis are:

Over the past ten years there were 71 drowning fatalities in the Bay of Plenty, 38 of these (53% of the total) were in Tauranga and the Western Bay of Plenty.

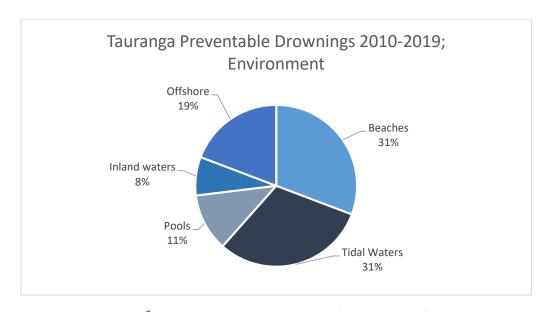
- Tauranga's 2017-2019 preventable drowning toll was 8 32% of the total 25 preventable drownings for the Bay of Plenty.
- Bay of Plenty's drowning rate was over twice the national rate 2018-2019 at 3.1 preventable drownings per 100,000 of population.
- 44% of Asian and 27% of Māori preventable drowning deaths in New Zealand over the past ten years occurred in the Bay of Plenty, the highest regional totals for these ethnicities.
- There were five home pool deaths in the Bay of Plenty 2010-2019, the highest number since records began, which made up 62.5% of all home pool deaths nationwide.

Further examination of the 2010-2019 data on preventable drowning deaths revealed for the Tauranga region:

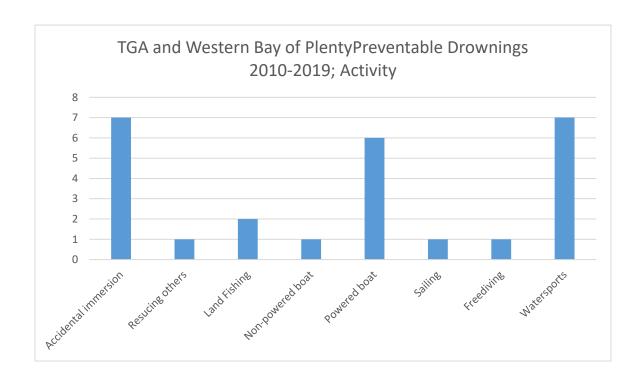
• The vast majority (62%) of preventable drowning deaths in Tauranga occurred at beaches and in tidal waters¹.

¹ Tidal waters are defined as Harbours and Harbour bars, Marinas, Rivers or an Estuary.





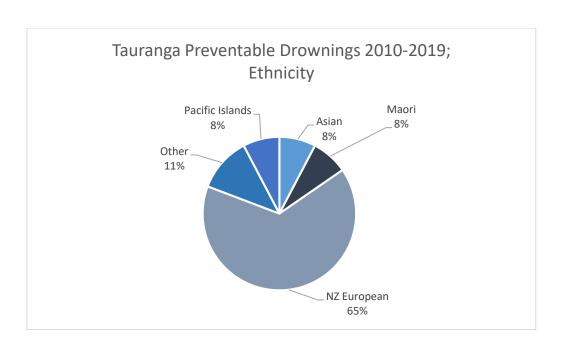
 Accidental immersion² was the most common reason for drowning, followed by water sports and powered boat;



New Zealand Europeans were the most likely ethnic group to drown;

² An accidental immersion is defined as an event where the subject had no intention of entering the water for recreational activity.





Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy

The Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy has been developed in consultation with sector stakeholders and the community and focuses on reducing preventable drowning deaths and injuries by building a culture of safe enjoyment in, on, and around the water in the Bay of Plenty. The purpose of the strategy is to develop a targeted and collaborative action plan for water safety in the Bay of Plenty and consists of seven key priority actions;

- 1. Full roll-out of the Water Skills for Life (WSFL) programme.
- 2. A sustained and collaborative relationship with iwi and the Māori community.
- 3. Improve Coastguard membership numbers and Day Skipper course enrolments.
- 4. Sustained investment in activities aimed at changing attitudes and behaviours.
- 5. Encourage stakeholder collaboration within the water-based sector.
- 6. Deliver water safety messages targeted at males.
- 7. Inspect and deploy internationally-recognised signage throughout the Bay of Plenty

As progress is made with each priority action, the strategy will be amended and adapted as a result of the Regional Manager's feedback and review.

A Governance Group of representatives from regional organisations with interest in water safety was established to act as the owners of the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy development and a Strategy Manager was employed.

The WSBoP Governance Group consists of eight volunteers;

Shirley Baker – Independent Chris Emmett and Chase Cahalane – Surf Life Saving NZ (SLSNZ) Antoni Lowe – Water Safety New Zealand (WSNZ) Kevin Winters – Councillor, Bay of Plenty Regional Council



Nick Chambers – Sport Bay of Plenty Sunny Peeters – Coastguard Eastern Caine Taiapa – Manaaki Te Awanui

The Strategy Manager, Dave White has been implementing the strategy since October 2019. This position reports directly to the WSBoP Governance Group and the role as the Regional Water Safety Strategy Manager is to coordinate, facilitate and review the delivery of water safety initiatives in the Bay of Plenty, according to the strategy's priority actions. The Strategy Manager was chosen for the role as he's got an extensive background in the water space – 16 years surf lifeguard at Piha Beach, an ex-NZ competitive swimmer, a qualified diver and water sport enthusiast.

Current Key Initiatives for next 12 months (to April 2021)

Relationship building with Iwi and Māori community

Although NZ Europeans account for the majority of preventable drownings in Tauranga 2010-2019, Māori are still overly represented in the overall Bay of Plenty preventable drowning statistics. The Strategy Manager has been working hard to establish relationships with the Māori community in order to collaboratively roll-out water safety messages and initiatives aimed at lowering the drowning rate for Māori. In addition, the Strategy Manager has already been collaborating with Alana Rapson and Haidee Kalirai from Tauranga City Council's Community Development team, Chris Nepia from the Western Bay of Plenty District Council's Takawaenga team, Sport Bay of Plenty's network, and Surf Lifesaving Eastern Regions network.

Further development of this initiative will see progress made in-line with the Water Safety New Zealand Māori Strategy.

Surf Rescue, Rescue Equipment and full roll-out of internationally recognised signage

Collaboration with Surf Lifesaving New Zealand has begun to implement three key initiatives aimed at reducing the drowning rate. These initiatives will be implemented in-line with the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy as a pilot, before then being rolled out nationally.

Surf Rescue

Surf Rescue is a programme designed in Australia aimed at training local surfers how to identify someone in trouble, conduct rescues on their boards and basic first aid. Surf Lifesaving patrols the beaches but there's still a vast number of rescues being done by surfers that are going unnoticed and not documented. The programme aims at reducing preventable drowning numbers in isolated areas. Surfing NZ has acquired the rights to implement the programme throughout New Zealand and the Strategy Manager will be collaborating with Surfing NZ and Surf Lifesaving NZ to implement the programme in the Bay of Plenty as a pilot before then being rolled out nationally.

Rescue Equipment

The Strategy Manager is collaborating with Surf Lifesaving NZ to identify priority areas where imminent drowning danger is present and deploy lifesaving rescue equipment, such as angel rings and rescue tubes.



Deployment of internationally recognised signage

The Strategy Manager and Surf Lifesaving NZ are collaborating to standardize water safety signage throughout the Bay of Plenty to an international standard – this includes identifying areas that are missing signage altogether. Once successfully implemented in the Bay of Plenty, this project will then see the standardization of signage throughout New Zealand.

Water Safety Month 2020

Water Safety Month (WSM) will again be promoted in Oct-Nov. The Strategy Manager is in talks with providers to develop a Bay-wide programme of events, workshops and activities aimed at sparking community engagement whilst promoting water safety.

The end goal is to touch on all aspects of water safety; beach, pool, under 5's, elderly, boats, rivers, disabilities, mental health and internationals/migrants. The aim of WSM is to produce a mass-collaboration between all stakeholders and providers in the sector and deliver a fun and informative month to the community.

Coastguard membership numbers and Coastguard Ed Day Skipper attendances

Tauranga and Western Bay of Plenty currently only has 5% of recreational watercraft users with a Coastguard membership. Working alongside Coastguard Eastern, the Strategy Manager aims to develop campaigns, promotional material and potentially workshops and events aimed at encouraging vessel owners to purchase a coastguard membership and/or attend a Day Skipper Course.

The Strategy Manager has already established, and maintains, a close relationship with the Coastguard NZ Eastern Manager and Bay of Plenty Regional Council to collaborate in the safer boating space.

Targeted Water Safety Messages

The Strategy Manager has developed a multi-channel communications plan and will be delivering targeted water safety messages in Tauranga to the demographics most at risk; males, the 50+ age bracket, boaties and the Asian demographic.

Supporting water safety initiatives

Water Safety Bay of Plenty will seek to support the promotion, collaboration and funding of water safety initiatives being managed by providers. To be eligible, the initiative must have an active interest delivering water safety messages, or vital water safety skills.

Funding Being Sought

Water Safety New Zealand is a funder operating at national level, providing funding to a wide range of providers and organisations to undertake drowning prevention activities. Water Safety New Zealand, TECT, TCC and BOPRC all contributed to the first year of the Strategy Manager's position and operational costs.



In the first six months the Strategy Manager has;

- travelled 14,700km visiting industry stakeholders, investigating signage locations and attending industry events;
- established 32 relationships with key stakeholders and providers, and;
- attended seven key events where he presented at four of them.

The Strategy Manager has also successfully developed an implementation plan for the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy, branding, and social media presence for Water Safety Bay of Plenty.

Funding is needed to ensure the Strategy Manager's position can continue including, operational costs to progress further implementation of the Bay of Plenty Water Safety Strategy. Unfortunately, Water Safety New Zealand (WSNZ) does not have the financial capacity to fully fund the Strategy Manager role and strategy development and as such it essential further contributions are obtained from key stakeholders for this project.

It is estimated that \$100,000 per annum is needed for the Strategy Manager's role (including computer, phone, vehicle, petrol, management overheads etc), plus additional funding for water safety initiatives and marketing campaigns.

Bay of Plenty Regional Council, and Water Safety New Zealand have already signalled their interest in continuing to support the Water Safety Bay of Plenty initiative and we are currently approaching other councils within the region for contributions.

The Strategy Manager role is being employed and housed by Sport Bay of Plenty on behalf of Water Safety Bay of Plenty, who are working closely with Water Safety New Zealand. It is more practical to have the regional strategy led by someone local. Water Safety Bay of Plenty has also planned to investigate funding and support from corporate entities, however, this will be on a mid to long-term basis given the financial impact COVID-19 has had on the local economy.

Contribution Sought from Tauranga City Council

Water Safety Bay of Plenty is seeking active support from Tauranga City Council and funding of \$30,000;

1. Funding the Strategy Manager position

Water Safety Bay of Plenty would like Tauranga City Council to consider contributing to funding of the salary and operational costs of the Strategy Manager. This is a critical role for the success of the strategy.

2. Providing financial support for water safety initiatives

Funding, where possible, will also go toward supporting the development and implementation of water safety initiatives in Tauranga and the Western Bay of Plenty.

3. Co-production and support

We would like the council to consider how its operations can be focused on further helping the water safety sector reduce preventable drowning in Tauranga and Western Bay of Plenty. WSBoP is willing to work in partnership with Tauranga City Council to implement initiatives to reduce preventable drowning deaths and injuries. The areas we



see the most scope for collaborative activity with Tauranga City Council is in delivering vital water safety messages aimed at changing behaviours and in developing better collaborative relationships with Māori.

To date, the Strategy Manager has received ongoing support and collaboration with Alana Rapson and Haidee Kalirai from Tauranga City Council's Community Development team.

4. Relationships and collaboration

We would like all Tauranga City Council Councillors and key Council staff to be made aware of the coalition of interested parties already present within the Tauranga and Western Bay of Plenty community and wider water safety sector around drowning prevention. There is opportunity for Tauranga City Council to further engage with these interested community groups, including Water Safety Bay of Plenty which led the development of the Strategy. There are also regional stakeholders that also have an interest in drowning prevention in the Bay of Plenty.

5. Promotion

Where possible, Water Safety Bay of Plenty would encourage Tauranga City Council to assist in promoting water safety initiatives and delivering water safety messages to the community.

Yes I would like to speak to this submission

I'm making this submission with the understanding there is likely to be another opportunity to submit to the annual plan, therefore this response is more generalised and focused on a few key points rather than responding to the specific questions asked as part of the consultation document.

- 1. The consultation document has been written around a singular narrative forcing the idea that growth is an independent entity without boundaries or control. I don't agree or support this being the main driver behind Tauranga City Council's annual plan.
- 2. Tauranga is at a cross-roads, we can go down the 'all growth is good' path regardless of the social or environment impacts which is the trajectory this current consultation document keeps us on, or we can unpack, expand and redefine what growth looks like in a world where social and environmental wellbeing are understood and prioritised as the foundations for a strong economy.
- 3. Unpacking, expanding and redefining what growth could look like under a different and well evidenced paradigm is a process that should involve community engagement and consultation. I do not agree with the approach proposed and I know of many others who also do not agree.
- 4. The consultation document speaks to some of the effects of 'growth' as increased congestion. Increased congestion is a result of design. We can design for more cars, and more congestion (the current trajectory) or we can design congestion out of our growing city through transport systems that prioritise public transport, cycling as transport and access by proximity. Population growth can happen without congestion, this needs to be priority.
- 5. The consultation document speaks of 'land and housing shortage that is making homes more expensive'. This is a man-made system. The supply and demand curve is a used as an excuse. Land owners, developers (often one in the same) and group builders are responsible for the rising costs of housing. The proposed status quo approach plays onto the hands of developers and does not result in a well-planned city. Sprawl into Greenfield areas (see point 7) is quicker and easier than densifying the existing suburban areas and has been the chosen route of least resistance in responding to the government's requirement (to plan for growth).
- 6. Housing and communities need to be developed with a focus on: inclusivity, diversity, sustainability and accessibility. This means breaking apart the cookie cutter approach that only works for developers and start delivering to need i.e. neighbourhoods of mixed tenure, mixed typology and genuine affordability, which includes ongoing running and maintenance costs. How to achieve this needs to be included as part of the annual plan.
- 7. On page 7 of the document, there is the following paragraph: 'If we do not plan well, we will end up with fragmented suburbs, and even more pressure on our roads, water supply wastewater systems and community amenities.' This implies investment into intensification and a compact city is a priority. However on the same page, Te Tumu and Tauriko West are confirmed as two potential growth areas. From my understanding these areas are not potential but already signed off with developers holding ownership of the land. Planning well in this context literally means reducing sprawl, not increasing it.
- 8. There is no reference in the consultation document to how climate change mitigation will be addressed through the Annual Plan. This is part of the new growth paradigm that the council should

be exploring. Better transport systems, improved housing performance, access by proximity, community connectedness and a strategic approach to benefiting from low impact design, urban wilding and nature connection are pathways towards strong and sustainable economic performance. 9. I support the City Plan, plan change to allow intensification along the Te Papa Peninsular. 10. I support Tauranga City Council supporting business organisations such Sustainable Business Network. It has come to my attention that Sustainable Business Network was singled out for a cut to its relatively small amount of TCC funding (\$20,000 per year), while other business organizations will receive far more funding from the council. The Sustainable Business Network is the only recipient I am aware of that receives funding related to sustainability, yet this is a much needed focus area for Tauranga. Therefore, I think (at least) current levels of funding should be continued and the Sustainable Business Network (Tauranga staff) should be included as a key stakeholder for planning the same way other business organisations i.e. Priority One, Tourism Bay of Plenty and businesses are.

11. I do not support the direction, focus or implications of the draft annual plan and sincerely hope the council goes back to the drawing board to create a draft that actually allows for genuine consultation on what type of future the entire community wants for the city, not just those who stand to benefit from uncontrolled growth. The COVID19 pandemic has presented Tauranga (New Zealand, the world) with the opportunity to see the beginnings of the positive impacts possible if we listen to a different narrative. This is one were:

- o cars have not been the dominate force on our roads, people have how can we continue this?
- o communities have gravitated towards nature connection (i.e. beaches, parks) and to each other (albeit with physical distancing) this is a massive learning for CBD development
- nature has flourished in close proximity to people regenerative ecosystems are vital to a growing city
- o certain types of waste have reduced (i.e. packaging, food and other FMCG)
- o water and air quality has improved
- o travel related emissions have reduced -
- the value of efficient, healthy homes is more prominent than ever we need to build better
- the vulnerability of people in our community has been exposed and responded to, like never before the annual plan must include all voices and needs

It is my submission that the council listen to the new narrative presented and develop a draft annual plan for proper and meaningful engagement and consultation where growth in its most traditional form (sprawl, congestion, pollution) is no longer being forced upon the public.

SUBMISSION FROM MAINSTREET TAURANGA INCORPORATED (DOWNTOWN TAURANGA) TO TAURANGA CITY COUNCIL'S DRAFT 2020/21 ANNUAL PLAN

OVERVIEW

Mainstreet Tauranga advocates for the businesses (650 member businesses) within our boundaries as defined by the Rules of Mainstreet Tauranga Incorporated (1.1C The Tauranga Central Business District ("CBD") means that area bounded by the seas to the east, Cameron Road to the west, 1st Avenue to the south, Harington Street and part of McLean Street to the north).

SUBMISSION

Mainstreet Tauranga Incorporated, trading as Downtown Tauranga, makes the following submission to Tauranga City Council's draft 2020/21 Annual Plan, specifically as it relates to policies and activities that impact or relate to the City Centre or our members.

Mainstreet Tauranga as part of our constitution is tasked with: 3.3a - With the cooperation of the Council develop the appearance, ambience and services of the CBD to make it more attractive, interesting and inviting to shoppers, visitors and persons carrying on business in the CBD.

Draft 2020/21 Annual Plan:

The COVID-19 pandemic has created an unprecedented and extremely challenging landscape. Going into the pandemic the city centre was already in a fragile position, impacted significantly by ongoing and often delayed development work, the associated restricted access that caused a public perception that the city centre was largely 'closed for business', insufficient parking supply, and significant vacant retail spaces across the city.

Prior to COVID-19, we implored Council to assist and support city centre businesses to enable them to trade through the disruptions.

Over the last year, as we met with Council on various occasions, the consistent message received was one of tacit support, but that we needed to outline any requests for funding through the annual plan process to ensure funding is allocated appropriately. We now ask that Council treat this submission as our official request for substantive support for the survival of the city centre while we also engage and provide feedback on Council income and expenditure.

The basis of this submission is to seek support for our city centre - the civic, commercial and cultural hub of our region. As Mainstreet Tauranga, our unwavering focus is on ensuring all steps are taken to shore up the viability of businesses, the removal of barriers and the delivery of appropriate support that, now more than ever, is needed to cultivate the sustainability of our CBD business community.

While our submission below has answered the specific areas that Council has sought feedback on, we have also included support required for the city centre to constructively assist getting the business community through COVID-19 and beyond

Rates

All ratepayers are facing uncertainty as this submission is being written. The commercial sector, has especially been impacted in the city centre over the last 2 years due to development-associated disruption, seismic strengthening projects, drawn-out streetscaping projects, the proliferation and expansion of suburban shopping centres, high vacancy levels and now, on top of that, the Covid-19 pandemic, resulting in a significantly shortened Cruise Ship season and the inability to trade during the Covid-19 Level 4 Lockdown and for most under Level 3. Reduction in income and latterly a total loss of income for many under Covid-19 makes it difficult to balance an increase in rates that is required by Council to deliver on essential services, infrastructure, stay ahead of growth and support a recovery - against the ability of ratepayers (the commercial tenants are the end-payers) to be able to meet their rates obligations. Therefore, we ask Council to consider these factors with any decisions that they make:

- Mainstreet Tauranga suggests waiving the rates increase for a minimum period of 6 months but acknowledges that an eventual increase will be required to allow our city to grow and develop appropriately as New Zealand's fifth largest city. Investment has been crippled in previous trienniums through a lack of funding streams, and so, to enable council to deliver what ratepayers want and expect, rate increases will be inevitable.
- More targeted rates relief for those businesses hardest hit by COVID-19 post and during
 construction work in their area. We don't want a repeat of the negative financial impact that
 businesses suffered at the southern end of Durham St, when the streetscaping was underway,
 causing one long term fringe CBD tenant to relocate to a suburban location.
- Allowing building owners to pay their rates in monthly instalments, so that they in turn can allow their tenants to pay monthly, would assist those businesses with tight or negative cashflows as they struggle to recover

The Uniform Annual General Charge (UAGC)

Mainstreet Tauranga opposes the reduction of the UAGC as it unfairly targets the commercial sector to fund council services that predominantly benefit residential ratepayers. It is also based on the assumption that higher value property owners, both residential and commercial, have the ability to pay higher rates because of the assets they own. The commercial sector has been severely affected by COVID-19 which potentially has long lasting consequences. Therefore, **Mainstreet Tauranga must support the status quo.**

Commercial Rates Differential

The city centre is predominantly made up of a number of small independent business owners; mum and dad boutique businesses as opposed to the malls that have the larger chain stores that have the ability to spread the load during difficult times. Any cost that is targeted at a commercial building owner is passed on to the tenant, above and beyond the rent that they pay. Given the disruption prior to and the catastrophic impact of COVID-19 on our city centre businesses, any further costs could be the difference between success or failure of the business.

The rates differential appeals to residential ratepayers as they benefit significantly, however the commercial sector is not necessarily cash rich and already pays towards areas that benefit commercial only through targeted rates, which is seen as a fairer way of apportioning cost. This also allows the commercial sector to see what the funds go towards rather than being part of a general pool of funds that has no transparency. These cost increases seriously impact business owners' incomes directly, the business owner needs to either find new customers, or increase prices to recover these costs, or it will directly reduce their personal incomes and ability to manage debt repayments. New customers and

price increases are unlikely to be successful strategies in the current climate, where they have already lost at least 1/12th of their annual income. **Mainstreet Tauranga strongly opposes the rates differential** being introduced this year in line with keeping the UAGC at status quo.

Transportation and Affiliated Services

We encourage Council to continue to work with Regional Council to deliver on improved bus services and a free bus service to the city centre to encourage public transport use and to take the pressure off the car parking supply shortage in the city centre, further exacerbated by the delays in the building of the much needed Harington St Transport Hub.

Under the current climate **Mainstreet Tauranga strongly opposes** the proposed increases in parking charges. Businesses in the city centre feel that they are already at a disadvantage to other strip shopping areas such as the Mount and Greerton which have, largely free parking and also due to the proliferation and expansion of suburban shopping malls. In the current climate an increase in parking charges at this time would have a negative impact on the CBD as a destination. As noted above, the community perception is that the CBD is a place to stay out of and a blanket increase in parking fees would further acerbate that perception. We are constantly told that the price is dictated by supply, however in this case the supply has been compromised with the delay of the new parking building. CBD businesses should not be disadvantaged by this, nor parking charges used as a catalyst to raise funds. We would favour a tiered costing structure for on street parking that would be advantageous to short term parking (even possibly free for the first 3 hours), but with a pricing disincentive to a longer stay, freeing up parking on a more regular basis rather than a blanket increase in charges. This would dissuade people using on street parking for all day parking but allow short term parking at a no charge or lower rate, attracting shoppers, lunchtime diners and service users to the CBD – increasing short term patronage.

With a solution in mind, Mainstreet Tauranga is mindful that decisions around parking supply, use and charging are based around anecdotal and one-off surveys. Considering the high impact of the decision making that only affects the city centre (being the only area with charged parking), investment in a parking eye system would provide up to date data collection, up to date parking supply availability with real time visitor information and would allow parking supply to be monitored in the most cost effective manner. An investment that will provide many benefits for the city centre and should be a consideration if not in the annual plan, then the 2021-31 Long Term Plan (LTP).

Mainstreets' Collective Response Plan

COVID-19 has seen the three Mainstreets form a stronger collective and collaborative to share ideas, insights and what has and hasn't worked for our members as we work to re-boot our SME sector across our respective locations. This has established not only a best practice approach but also a collective voice to work through the challenges facing us all.

The problems and concerns facing each of the Mainstreets are the same and the support therein is suited to a collective response plan through Tauranga City Council, which we endorse and support. We would see this response fund sitting over and above our existing funding and work that we do individually for our members.

Small businesses are important contributors to the New Zealand economy, accounting for 97% of all business and before COVID-19 employed 30% of all employees and contributed circa 29% to GDP. Mainstreets are primarily made up of SME's and are therefore an important sector to support, especially during these uncertain times. The Mainstreet organisations have direct contact with their members and have the ability to 'take the pulse' of their communities quickly. This should be advantageous and unparalleled when aligned with a robust collective response plan. Mainstreet

Tauranga requests the appointment of a Mainstreets/TCC Response Task Force to work collaboratively through solutions. We seek to be around the table with Council at discussion time, to develop a truly collaborative approach.

ACTIVATE Vacant Spaces

At the end of the 2019/20 financial year Elected Members, through the CEO, allocated funding towards supporting the city centre. The ACTIVATE Vacant Spaces initiative allows us to add vibrancy, change perceptions and influence behaviours by creating a curated, diverse and exciting programme of exhibitions, displays, performances and retail pop-up experiences in the vacant spaces across the city centre, to help change the public perception of the CBD. In its first formative weeks the programme delivered 6 activations and just prior to lock down had a further 24 activation initiatives, from community groups and creative individuals, on the calendar for launch. These remain in freeze mode at this time until restrictions lift.

Due to the COVID-19 Lockdown, the initial pilot programme, that was due to run through until June 2020 will now, obviously need to be extended. Given the 4-week Lockdown period and the uncertainty around when we will move from Level 3 to Level 2 and beyond and the implications for foot traffic flow and crowd gathering in the city centre, the Activate Vacant Spaces pilot programme unlikely to reignite until June or July. Mainstreet Tauranga will then continue the pilot programme, that had only been running for 10 weeks prior to lock down.

The programme delivers key benefits to the city centre that need to be promoted and profiled to build positive perceptions. Additionally, we can build integrity and value around the ACTIVATE brand to create a strong value proposition that buys us sustainability and longevity. This reinvigoration of the city centre and mindset reset is more important now with the added impact of COVID-19, so it is presumed that the pilot programme delivery will be extended to the end of October or longer, dependent on when it can be resumed safely under government restrictions.

Future funding streams will be intrinsically dependent on the success of the pilot and the delivery on the KPI's for the city centre. The marketing and PR approach and outcomes play an important role in the ability to attract the target market into the city centre.

We would ask that, based on the success of the pilot programme, serious consideration be given to extending further funding to this programme and that funding be set aside in the annual plan in support this to the tune of a further \$100K.

Cruise Ship Shuttle Support

In previous submissions, we have requested funding support for the Cruise Ship Shuttle Service. Clearly this sector remains under incredible uncertainty, however we need to include, as part of our submission, that should the cruise ship sector regain momentum and ships return to the Port of Tauranga, we would (with support from Tourism BOP) be seeking financial support from both the Tauranga City Council and Regional Council to bring passengers via a free service to the city centre. A requirement of the Port of Tauranga and the cruise ship lines is that, for the service to be located within the Port, it must be a free service to passengers. To secure acceptable passenger numbers it must be located where the passengers disembark from the ships. It cannot operate outside of the Port gates as Tourism BOP has granted a limited number of exclusive licences for tourism-based businesses to operate from that location. Without the free service, CBD businesses are disadvantaged in having access to this part of the tourist sector. In the previous season (2018/19) the shuttle service delivered over 21,000 passengers to the Tauranga CBD, so the impact is substantial.

Added Business Assistance

- We ask that council put user fees and charges, such as, but not limited to, licence to occupy (LTO's) areas on hold., for at least the next 6-12 months as that will assist those businesses most struggling. We would also ask that LTO's be placed on hold in any vicinity of ongoing development work where disruption to or use of the space is affected, including the need for increased cleaning of the area. This would assist hospitality businesses (that run on low margins) that have been impacted significantly under the COVID-19 lockdown.
- We ask that street asset and amenity cleaning be improved. If COVID-19 has taught us anything it is to be more vigilant on health and safety matters, including cleanliness. Public seating areas in the city centre, especially those under or near trees need to have an increased cleaning regime implemented. A mossy mould accumulates on the brickwork and cobbling around these seating areas which is both unsightly and uninviting. This would include the seating and artificial turf in the pop-up park which has a strong urination smell at times, the seating and stage area in the Edgewater Fan and in and around the bus interchange in Willow Street

Summary

Mainstreet Tauranga asks Council to balance fiscal responsibility with financial support for the city centre business community and that when making decisions through the annual plan process and beyond that Council maintains a balance between want and need, look to alternative revenue sources and work smarter for the betterment of Tauranga. Through the different levels of COVID-19 residents and businesses have been asked to do things differently, look outside the square and do things for the greater good – we ask that Council work under the same premise. Work with the private sector to crank the local economy and make pragmatic decisions that will see Tauranga meet its growth goals without crippling its business sector.
