- Provide guidance to staff on levels of service relevant to the role and scope of the committee.
- Establish and participate in relevant task forces and working groups.
- Engage in dialogue with strategic partners, such as Smart Growth partners, to ensure alignment of objectives and implementation of agreed actions.
- Confirmation of committee minutes.

Delegations to standing committees

- To make recommendations to Council outside of the delegated responsibility as agreed by Council relevant to the role and scope of the Committee.
- To make all decisions necessary to fulfil the role and scope of the Committee subject to the delegations/limitations imposed.
- To develop and consider, receive submissions on and adopt strategies, policies and plans relevant to the role and scope of the committee, except where these may only be legally adopted by Council.
- To consider, consult on, hear and make determinations on relevant strategies, policies and bylaws (including adoption of drafts), making recommendations to Council on adoption, rescinding and modification, where these must be legally adopted by Council.
- To approve relevant submissions to central government, its agencies and other bodies beyond any specific delegation to any particular committee.
- To appoint a non-voting Tangata Whenua representative to the Committee.
- Engage external parties as required.

Membership

Partners Tauranga City Council and "nga hapu me nga iwi o Tauranga Moana" representing Tangata Whenua within the Tauranga City Council rohe (boundaries).

Tangata Whenua representatives are to be those with signed hapu protocols. One of the six Tangata Whenua representatives is to be a Kaumatua. Kaumatua representation is to have the ability to be shared between two Kaumatua if required.

Background

Council is committed to establishing and monitoring appropriate links with Tangata Whenua to enable effective relationships to develop and meet a number of legislative requirements including those under the Resource Management Act 1991 and the Local Government Act.

- 1. Tangata Whenua are deemed to be the respective Iwi and Hapū of Tauranga Moana.
- 2. The Local Government Act 1974 and Local Government Act 2002 contain provisions relating to the exercise of the powers, functions and duties of the Tauranga City Council.

Principles of the partnership

The Partners:

- Recognise the Treaty of Waitangi as the founding document of Aotearoa NZ.
- Will work with respect, goodwill, honesty, trust and integrity toward the other party and celebrate cultural diversity.
- Recognise that the relationship is a mutual two-way relationship and any changes of the agreement need to involve discussions and agreement between the partners.
- Recognise the need for Tauranga City Council to work within a legislative framework.
- Recognise the independence of each partner, including:
 - (a) The tangata whenua representatives as a voice for the Māori communities;
 - (b) Recognise the independence of hapū and iwi;
 - (c) The Council as a democratic decision maker, responsible to the community as a whole.

Role and scope

- To forge an ongoing effective and meaningful partnership between the Tauranga City Council and Tangata Whenua.
- To facilitate meaningful understanding of future impacts on key issues affecting Tangata Whenua and Māori that Council can influence.

The functions and key tasks are:

- (a) To bring to the other partner's attention issues / concerns in respect of existing strategy or policy.
- (b) To exchange information of mutual interest.
- (c) To discuss new initiatives approaches and directions.
- (d) Agree agenda topics for the following three consecutive meetings.

Communication

- To educate the wider community on Tangata Whenua issues.
- To establish and maintain communication and consultation channels within the Council organisation and Tangata Whenua groups.

Monitoring

- To regularly monitor projects, policies and strategies managed or under development by Council which affect Tangata Whenua.
- To regularly monitor progress of key issues identified by Tangata Whenua through reporting of Council and the Tangata Whenua Collective (Te Rangapū Mana Whenua o Tauranga Moana).
- To monitor the on-going development and process of the Standing Committee.

Power to recommend

- To Council or any Standing Committee as it deems appropriate.
- Reports to Council.

9.1 Update on Te Manawataki o Te Papa - Gareth Wallis

Power point Presentation

Key points

• A power point presentation displayed the design of Te Manawataki o Te Papa which included

the Library, Community Hub, Museum, Exhibition Gallery, Civic Whare and the public realms which included Masonic Park and the Tauranga Waterfront

- Te Manawataki o Te Papa program of works was a suite of projects.
- The innovative, modern Library and Community Hub building had started construction and was scheduled to be completed in mid 2026.
- Noted the Maori patterns seen in presentation were just placeholders, not actual design.
- Once the piling of the Library and Community Hub was completed, the piling would commence on the Museum, Exhibition Gallery and Civic Whare. These buildings were scheduled to be completed in 2028.
- Every city needed a heart and Tauranga CBD had faded. The rebuild would benefit the city socially, economically and culturally for generations to come.
- The Tauranga waterfront was currently under construction removing the carparks to create a public space.
- Tauranga was the fifth largest and fastest growing city in Aotearoa.
- The Council had completed upgrades to the Cargo Shed and carpark on Dive Crescent.
- A new railway underpass and Tunks Reserve were also completed December 2023.
- A power point presentation displayed the plans for water front upgrades and the boardwalk and promenade from Memorial Park to the Strand.
- A destination playground was scheduled to be completed late 2024.
- In 2025, Council would be moving into a new building on 90 Devonport St.
- Key feedback from land holders said they would like beach replenishment. Council staff were working to test beach replenishment by installing groins.
- The decline in CBD's were a national and global issue, not just Tauranga.
- Noted that parking spaces in the CBD had increased since January 2023.

In response to questions

- The NZ Post service was contractual and Council it was on Council's radar.
- Staff visited a large percentage of the houses between Memorial Park and The Strand and heard their concerns.
- Noted the private sector of investors in the rebuild of Te Manawataki o Te Papa.
- City Centre tours had taken place for Council staff and recently extended to the City Centre business with the intention to extend to the general public in late 2024.

Discussion points raised

- Disappointed that the Paper Plus in the CBD was closing meaning a loss of Postal Service with Tauranga City Centre.
- Commend and thanked Gareth for the presentation on Te Manawataki o Te Papa.
- Suggested a power point of sorts be shared with the wider community.

- PURPOSE: The purpose of this report is to provide the Tangata Whenua / Tauranga City Council Committee members with an update of RMW progress.

This report covers the timeframe from 21 February 2024 to now.

1. Tangata Whenua Representation on Council Committees

The partnership between Tauranga City Council and Te Rangapu continues to grow and develop, working together to bring about the best opportunities for Tauranga City. The relationship with tangata whenua is currently maintained through several forums, committees, and protocol agreements.

2. Workshops and Special Workshops Update

Since the last TW/TCC Committee meeting held in February '24, Te Rangapu have come together in workshops to discuss and consider not only our local authority developments, but also central government plans and reforms. These workshops provide an opportunity for Te Rangapu to explore and develop alongside Council staff, Council concepts, procedures, policies, and projects and for tangata whenua to have input. I have provided subject areas to date:

- a) Cultural Monitoring Protocol review;
- b) Property Acquisition & Disposal policy review;
- c) Urban Design Action and Investment Plan (AIP);
- d) Wayfinding and Signage Strategy;
- e) Te Aupikitanga Strategic Plan development;
- f) Consultation/Engagement Policy for Resource Consents Working group; and
- g) Combined RMW and Kaumatua Forum.

3. Tauranga City Local Election

The members of RMW with tangata whenua communities are already having discussions around a campaign strategy and targeting voters less likely to vote, increasing Māori voter participation to increase their awareness and importance about voting, what types of information and positive messaging is needed, how it will be delivered, what collateral needs will be developed and certainty around timing and rollouts in preparation for the local elections on 20 July 2024.

Some of the key discussions we have landed on are:

- a. Visibility and rally for support at public events, distribution of enrolment packs, pamphlets, etc.
- b. Creation and development communications and positive messaging on social media.
- c. Education and awareness of what the wards are and where.
- d. Provide opportunities around the Māori electoral option and how it works (switching).
- e. Timeline and process.
- f. Encouraging quality and genuine candidates to stand for both the Māori ward and general wards.
- g. Enlist Māori and non-Māori influencers who have a good standing in our community who are keen to support and encourage.
- h. Organise at least 2 marae-based candidates' events for the Māori ward and Māori standing for general wards.

4. Strategic Planning Refresh

Our final planning session was facilitated for Te Rangapū to check in with current and future strategic priorities and direction earlier this month.

We needed to think about how things have changed since 2021 and look forward to considering how activities of the future (e.g. Tauranga City Council Long-Term Plan, the 2024 elections, etc) might change or uplift on Te Rangapu strategic priorities.

Te Rangapu have reviewed their vision and mission statements that provide focus for us as a team, thinking about the future, what we want to achieve and are we going in the right direction.

5. Te Pāhou Urupa

On behalf of RMW I want to thank the Commissioners for approving the recommendation regarding the reconnection of the land known as Te Pāhou Reserve by way of transfer to the Ngāi Te Ahi Settlement Trust at nil consideration and to give delegated authority to the Chief Executive to negotiate and approve the terms and conditions of the Sale and Purchase Agreement.

The RMW are aware that 170 submissions were received prior to the Council meeting held on 26 February 2024 with overwhelming support for the transfer of Te Pāhou Reserve back to Ngāi Te Ahi and Ngāti He. Again, it is noted that this process is a tangible by-product of the hard work of Te Rangapū Mana Whenua of Tauranga Moana in relation to TCC's Property Acquisitions and Disposals Policy.

6. Housing on Maori owned land.

It is encouraging to hear that there will be 5 - 7 Māori land blocks that will activate their housing aspirations and initiatives, within the next 3 to 5 years. It is more inspiring that TCC, through Tane Brott, is assisting some of the Māori landowners and trustees in respect to planning, infrastructure, feasibility, and funding.

A number of these land block owners have met with TCC staff to discuss their future development aspirations and plans and the next steps are to continue to have these meetings and feedback and discuss potential future draft plans.

7. Key priorities

- Elections 2024 for Tauranga City.
- Strategic planning refresh.
- Korero with the Commissioners on the latest development of the fast-track consenting legislation and changes to the NPS for Freshwater Management.
- Mana o te Wai Statements.
- Continue to uphold the mana and relationships with TCC post Commission.
- Develop a strong and ongoing strategy to support the Te Awanui Ward councilor.

Key points of concern

Environmental Impacts.

Intense rainfall and potential future cyclones, as we are all aware, have increasingly impacted Aotearoa and most areas are still recovering. We in Tauranga Moana are noticing more slips and landslides around Tauranga Moana harbour and Te Tahuna o Rangataua.

We acknowledge the importance and urgency to address climate change for the benefit of current and future generations, this is an ongoing issue.

Myrtle Rust on Pohutukawa was detected on Mauao in 2017 and Mediterranean Fan Worm was detected in Pilot Bay in 2023, caused by an owner cleaning under their boat in the harbour.

In 2018 two Asian paddle crabs were caught in the Tauranga Harbour near the Matapihi rail bridge. An ongoing trapping programme is carried out in Tauranga Harbour.

We all need to work together to address these issues of pathogens and pest invasions on our shores as they will impact culturally and economically in our country.
